How to make a chocolate cake in a mug

The ingredients, 3 tablespoons, a large mug, a mixing bowl, microwave oven, knife, saucer.

Ingredients (serves 1)

4 tablespoons of flour 1 egg 3 tablespoons milk a quarter of a teaspoon of vanilla


<u>Time needed</u>

Preparation time: 10 minutes Cooking time: 3 minutes Ready in:13 minutes

Method:

- 1. First add the dry ingredients to the mug. Mix these well.
- 2. After that, crack an egg and add it to your mug. Be sure to mix it well to avoid any pockets of flour in the corners.
- 3. Then, pour the milk, oil and chocolate chips into the mug and mix this well. Add the vanilla extract.

- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons cocoa
- 3 tablespoons melted butter or oil
- 1 tablespoon of choc chips

- 4. Next, place your mug in the microwave and cook it for 3 minutes on maximum power (1000watt). Wait until the cake stops rising and sets in the mug.
- 5. Finally, if necessary, run a knife around the sides of the mug, and tip the still warm cake out of the mug and onto a saucer. Wait until everything cools down and enjoy eating your cake!
