Supporting Reluctant Readers

Motivating reluctant readers can be challenging especially when it is someone whose reading ability is far below age/grade level expectations. So what can teachers and families to do support? Start by allowing children to take some time to think about topics that most interest them. Give them plenty of time to browse through various genres of books. Each genre offers an opportunity for learning. Graphic novels for example, increase vocabulary, and can build confidence and stamina. Non-fiction texts include visuals and short texts-such as infographics- which have lots of great information. You can also teach your child how to determine whether or not a book is "just right" for them. Help them choose books that are high interest but are writen at a lowe reading level or even allow them to listen to audiobooks. Finally, utilize your local librarian to help find books that are in your child's area of interest and are written at their reading level

> **What are the major events that took place in this story? (Tell them in the order in which they occurred.)
