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

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Editor's Message

Why I Opted for the iPhone 13



very year, Apple fans swap rumors and eagerly anticipate the September iPhone event. This fall, many of us felt let down when Apple delivered a lineup of devices that were decidedly lackluster. Apple leaker Jon Prosser took to Twitter with a meme of clowns standing in line with a caption that read, "All the iPhone 12 users lining up to pre-order iPhone 13." Ouch (see page 44 for more on the Apple leakers).

I knew it was bad when my dad, who usually can't resist a new Apple product, called me to say he was passing this year, adding, "They didn't announce anything new!" To be fair, that's not an entirely accurate statement. The iPhone 13 line lacks new hardware features, it's true, but that doesn't mean it's devoid of practical hardware improvements you'll feel. The battery life is getting a hefty bump across the board, which is nothing to scoff at, considering poor battery life is the biggest complaint we hear from readers.

The 13 line also includes new computational photography features, an exciting new field of on-device machine learning that Apple's been leveraging to deliver things like Night mode in the iPhone 12 line. This year, the iPhone 13 includes Cinematic mode, a computational photography feature that's essentially Portrait mode for video and shifts focus like you see in the movies. Other photography improvements include smart filters that adjust for skin tone called Photographic Styles; and Macro Photography, which captures detail in close-up shots in the Pro line. While cool, Cinematic mode is targeted at professional content creators more than your everyday user (page 10).

Considering where I work, it will come as no surprise that I usually buy the best new iPhone every year. This year, however, I passed on the Pro and bought the iPhone 13. Why? Because, for the first time, I don't believe I'll be missing much.

Now let me clarify. I'm upgrading to the 13 from the second-generation iPhone SE, a placeholder I picked up after losing my iPhone 12 Pro in Mexico this spring (it's a long story). If you own an iPhone 12 Pro or even 11 Pro, I'd recommend sitting tight over buying the 13, otherwise you'll actually lose a few features in the process.

But for everyone upgrading this year, there are fewer differences between the base and Pro models than ever before, making it harder to justify the at least \$200 price difference. With the 13, I get the edge-to-edge OLED display, longer battery life, MagSafe charging, and improved 5G support. Not to mention I get most new camera features including Cinematic mode, Photographic Styles, and bigger sensors for brighter low-light shots. Plus, it'll support all iOS 15 features including Live Text (which requires a XS or later).

I've made my peace with the fact that I'll miss out on things like Macro Photography, the LiDAR scanner, and a bit of graphics processing power. I feel the most pinched about foregoing ProMotion, which delivers higher refresh rates for real-time, buttery smooth graphics. I may live to regret this decision if the difference is as noticeable as when Apple switched to OLED displays a couple years ago.

Even if that's the case, though, I'll console myself by using the money I saved to buy the new Apple Watch Series 7, another release that didn't get a full redesign but that comes with useful upgrades like fast charging, an on-screen keyboard for easier texting, and a bigger and flatter display (page 20). Who knows, I may even buy a purple iPad mini too (page 16). While I respect any of you who, like my dad, are sitting out this product cycle, I'm looking forward to the everyday improvements this year.

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

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

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

CAMERA UPGRADES: EVERYONE'S A PRO!

One of the most interesting things about this year's iPhone line isn't that there are exciting new camera features—this is

Apple after all—but that two of the main improvements are on all four models. Typically, the headlining camera features are reserved for the Pro models, while the budget models get reliable yet less exciting upgrades. But both the new Cinematic mode and Photographic Styles will grace every member of the iPhone 13 line. This begs the question—is it worth going Pro this time around at all? Perhaps. We'll tackle that in a moment. But now, let's take a closer look at Cinematic mode and Photographic Styles.

CINEMATIC MODE

Cinematic mode is a new feature that automatically adjusts the focus of your iPhone camera while you are shooting video. Much like the Center Stage feature available on the iPad, it adapts to how many people are in the frame and can even change focus based on who's talking. Because artificial intelligence isn't perfect at deeming what should be the focus of a shot (we've all had funny Portrait mode mishaps), Apple also lets users control the depth of field and focus manually, and even edit them after recording the video.

PHOTOGRAPHIC STYLES

Another feature coming to all four models is Photographic Styles. This basically allows you to set preferences—either customized or one of the four pre-made options from Apple—for things like exposure, contrast, and more. It's more customizable than a filter and gives photographers the chance to ensure continuity between photos. If you know what you like, why change it?

PRO ONLY

Of course, Apple saved some gems for the Pro models. Here's what's coming to these heavyweights:

MACRO PHOTOGRAPHY

The iPhone camera changes seem to be all about precision, so it's natural Apple chose to expand the Pro line's macro capabilities. The new macro feature on the Pro line's Ultra Wide camera allows you to take photos of subjects just two centimeters from the camera. I've struggled with macro photography on my iPhone in the past, so this is an exciting development. Smile, tiny bugs! You can also now take slo-mo macro videos, opening us up to a whole new genre of bizarre.

EXPANDED NIGHT MODE

Low-light situations have always been among the most frustrating for iPhone photographers and videographers. The new iPhone 13 Pro models address this by adjusting the apertures on each of their three cameras and offering Night mode on each. This expands what the photographer can do in low-light situations, though glorious moon pictures may still just be a daydream.

WHICH IPHONE SHOULD I BUY?

Which iPhone you decide to buy will likely depend on your budget, your required storage space, and the features you consider most important. If the iPhone 13 line isn't speaking to you, you can always save money and buy an iPhone 11, iPhone 12, or iPhone SE, all of which are still available, or get a refurbished older model.



IPHONE 13 PRO MAX

Once you upgrade to the Pro Max, it's hard to go back! The iPhone 13 Pro Max is the most expensive iPhone model, but it brings a bevy of fun and practical features to compensate for the heavy price tag. The iPhone 13 Pro Max has the largest screen of the 13 line. With a muted and professional color palette, both the Pro and Pro Max models offer a storage capacity of up to 1 TB (the largest amount of storage available on any iPhone ever!). If you love having the highest quality camera features, a larger phone, and a nearly inexhaustible amount of storage space, this iPhone is for you!



IPHONE 13 PRO

If you love having the best camera and cinematography features while sticking to a more portable option, the iPhone 13 Pro might be your match. With a smaller screen than the iPhone Pro Max, this iPhone model has the telephoto lens offered only with the iPhone 13 Pro and Pro Max for a 6X optical zoom and superior Portrait mode. If you love photography or videography, or need a lot of storage capacity, it is worth shelling out the extra bucks to upgrade to the iPhone 13 Pro.



IPHONE 13

The base model iPhone 13 has twice the storage capacity of the iPhone 12, with faster processing speeds. The 13 costs \$200 less than the iPhone 13 Pro, making it a less expensive option for those who still want fast processing speeds, most of the premium camera features, and longer battery life.



IPHONE 13 MINI

- Size & Display: 5.4-inch Super Retina XDR display
- Camera: Ultra Wide, Wide

With the small size relished by many dedicated iPhone users, the iPhone 13 mini packs a punch for the price! With up to 512 GB storage capacity (nearly double its predecessor), the iPhone 13 mini has the new A15 Bionic chip, making for faster processing speeds. It is also enabled for 5G streaming and supports up to 17 hours of video playback. Essentially, the iPhone 13 mini offers a longer battery life, twice the storage, and upgraded camera features for only \$100 more than the iPhone 12 mini, which makes for a strong argument to upgrade to the latest mini model.

ProRes is coming to iPhone 13 Pro models. ProRes is a video format first introduced in Final Cut Pro 6 in 2007 and is

considered ideal for editing. It's easy on your CPU, allowing your computer to run smoothly while you're editing video. The files are smaller than uncompressed videos, even at its highest quality, enabling you to take more high-quality videos without using up your storage. Though 1 terabyte (TB) will be hard to fill!

BATTERY LIFE

The new chip, in combination with a larger battery, give the iPhone 13 what Apple calls all-day battery life. The iPhone 13 provides up to 2.5 more hours in a day than the 12, and the 13 mini provides up to 1.5 more hours in a day than the 12 mini, according to Apple.

The iPhone 13 Pro and Pro Max also offer all-day battery life, and feature improvements of 1.5 hours longer in a day than the iPhone 12 Pro, and 2.5 hours longer than the iPhone 12 Pro Max.

A15 BIONIC CHIP

An upgraded chip is included in all four iPhone 13 models but with slightly different features for the Pro models.

The A15 Bionic chip can process 15.8 trillion operations per second, improving power and efficiency for extended battery life, as well as better graphics and display appearance. The chip also enables faster machine-learning capabilities to improve iOS 15 features like Live Text in the Camera app, as well as third-party app experiences.

The Pro version of the A15 Bionic differs from the standard in just one way: a 5-core GPU vs. a 4-core one. This makes a significant difference, though, and Apple claims it's the "fastest chip ever in a smartphone." This means that the iPhone 13 Pro and Pro Max offer up to 50 percent faster graphics than any other smartphone on the market!

NEW PROMOTION DISPLAY

We've been hearing rumors about ProMotion coming to the iPhone for some time now, and the iPhone 13 line has made it a reality. ProMotion display technology means your iPhone's

refresh rate is fast, and, therefore, your screen is very responsive. The standard refresh rate is 60 times per second (60Hz); ProMotion refreshes at a rate of 120 times per second (120Hz), making it twice as fast. It also adjusts according to your use, saving battery life in your downtime. You can also enjoy greater responsiveness in games, leading to a better gaming experience.

In response to Apple's ProMotion announcement, Samsung took to Twitter to state, "We've been refreshing at 120Hz for a while now..." While it is true they've been using a 120Hz refresh rate since March 2020, they don't offer the variable refresh rate, meaning it's either/or with 60Hz and 120Hz, which could really drain your battery if you use the latter.

BODY, DURABILITY & DISPLAY

The composition of the iPhone 13 line is nearly identical to that of the iPhone 12. Apple introduced the Ceramic Shield display last year and called it "the biggest jump in durability ever on iPhone." All iPhone 13 versions are water-resistant at a depth of up to 6 meters for up to 30 minutes, also the same protection the iPhone 12 line offered.

A few things that have changed include the rear camera layout for the iPhone 13 and 13 mini, as well as the sensors and lenses on the iPhone 13 Pro and Pro Max cameras.

Display features between the iPhone 12 and 13 lines remain largely unchanged, except for improvements in Super Retina XDR OLED contrast and brightness. All four of the iPhone 13s offer a 28 percent increase of maximum outdoor brightness, a higher peak brightness for HDR content, and an improved contrast ratio between colors. One more small difference that many may appreciate is a smaller "notch" at the top of the display. The notch is 20 percent smaller on iPhone 13 models than on their iPhone 12 equivalents!

Whether you're jumping at the chance to get your hands on one of these new models or waiting until next year, it's hard to deny that the A15 Bionic chip, new camera modes, and ProMotion display move the iPhone forward in a solid way.

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

new generation of iPads is here. The ninthgeneration iPad and sixth-gen iPad mini are optimized for video use, including features like increased brightness, better color with True Tone, and movement tracking in videos with Center Stage.

WHAT'S NEW WITH THE NINTH-GEN IPAD?

The latest generation of iPad didn't change much about the winning formula. It still has a Home button and a 10.2-inch display. It actually offers one less color; the eight-gen came in gold, but the ninth doesn't offer that option, only space gray and silver. Both generations will run iPadOS 15, with all its exciting new features.

You're sure to notice that the ninth-gen display has True Tone, Apple's color accuracy and vibrancy technology, which makes the colors pop no matter your lighting environment.

This subtle feature is a favorite among our editorial staff, so it's cool to see it finally come to Apple's most popular iPad.

The ninth-generation iPad processor did get an upgrade from the A12 Bionic to the A13 Bionic. The A13 premiered in 2019 with the iPhone 11 series, so while it is a powerful mobile processor, it lands the newest iPad at the budget end of Apple's fleet of new devices.

Another huge improvement is the front camera, which can capture 12 megapixels, compared to its predecessor's 1.2 megapixels. That's a drastic increase, and it comes with an Ultra Wide angle lens designed to capture a very wide field of view. This lets the camera automatically focus on you as you move around your environment—a feature Apple calls Center Stage.

THE MINI: GOOD THINGS COME IN SMALL PACKAGES

The iPad mini has a whole new look! With an edge-to-edge screen and no Home button, the sixth generation of the iPad mini looks more like a Pro model. It features a bigger screen size—8.3 inches over the older generation's 7.9 inches—even though it's very slightly smaller and lighter. The sixth-generation iPad mini will ship with iPadOS 15 and all its sweet new features, but owners of the older fifth-gen iPad minis can grab those just by updating their operating system.

The iPad mini rocks Apple's A15 Bionic processor and Neural Engine, new in 2021 and released alongside the iPhone 13 series. This is Apple's top mobile processor, for first-rate mobile gaming, graphics, art and design apps, and data-processing applications.

The new iPad mini adds a slew of features including one we're particularly excited about: USB-C connectivity! That's right, the iPad mini now has a USB-C port instead of the traditional Lightning! That means it can connect to all kinds of peripherals, including keyboards, cameras, mice, and hard drives.

Those other new features include 5G connectivity in the cellular models, Touch ID built into the Sleep/Wake button, 4K video recording, stereo speakers in landscape mode, and

support for the Apple Pencil (2nd generation). But the main updates are video-focused: the display is higher quality with 2266-by-1488 resolution and True Tone, which will adapt its colors to your lighting environment for accurate color representation.

THE 12-MEGAPIXEL CAMERA & CENTER STAGE

Both the ninth-generation iPad and the sixth-generation iPad mini feature front-facing Ultra Wide cameras capable of capturing 12 megapixels of detail. That number—12 megapixels is a measure of the amount of detail contained in the images the camera can capture. For comparison, the eighthgeneration iPad's front-facing camera could only capture 1.2 megapixels. At 12 megapixels, the iPad's camera now has the same resolution as the iPhone 13 Pro series. Both of these front-facing cameras feature HDR for photos, but if you want Smart HDR you'll need the full-sized iPad, not the iPad mini.

The flagship feature of this series, besides the A13 Bionic chip, is Center Stage, which zooms in on that ultra-wide field of view to focus on your face and body while you talk, and dynamically follows you when you move around in front of the camera.

Center Stage is one of those features that doesn't necessarily sound like a big deal but could actually be a game changer for video producers. In today's world of TikToks, Boomerangs, Zooms, and whatever those kids will be doing next, Center Stage is going to help a lot of people capture better content more easily (not to mention ordinary old video

WHO SHOULD BUY THE NINTH-**GENERATION IPAD?**

This iPad is the workhorse of the tablet world and remains the appropriate option for anyone interested in entering that world for the first time, or for general use in most applications. It's especially appropriate if you don't want to spring for the higher-end models such as the Pro series, the iPad Air, or the iPad mini.

WHO SHOULD BUY THE IPAD MINI?

The iPad mini is the smallest iPad, but with the A15 Bionic, it's actually faster than the larger iPad Air and iPad. The iPad mini will appeal to anyone who wants to be able to put their iPad in a pocket or on a wearable strap, or hold it comfortably in one hand. For example, I like the iPad mini for the same reasons I prefer paperback-sized books over magazine-sized books: It's a little device with a lot of power and a loyal following of enthusiastic fans. **(**

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APPLE WATCH SERIES 7:

FAST CHARGING, FULL KEYBOARD & RUGGED

he redesigned Apple Watch Series 7 gives the newest addition to the watch family a softer shape with rounded corners and a larger, brighter display. Other changes include new and improved fitness metrics, a full keyboard, faster charging, a higher dust resistance, new colors, and more!

Let's dive into what the Series 7 has to offer.

percent more text to appear on your screen than on the Series 6 so you can spend more time reading emails and texts than scrolling through them. This alone is a game-changer in my book because I want to use my Apple Watch more independently from my iPhone.

A REDESIGNED LOOK WITH A LARGER DISPLAY

Ahead of Apple's September announcement, rumors had us envisioning a Series 7 with flat edges to match Apple's other newly released iPhones and iPads, and I was terrified because I much prefer a round design. Instead, the Series 7 has a softer shape with more rounded corners. The new, brighter display has a refractive edge that results in a full-screen look. The larger display was made possible by reducing the size of borders rather than increasing the watch's size—a celebration for those with small wrists!

A FULL KEYBOARD

With the new larger display also comes a full keyboard and two larger fonts. From my experience using full keyboards created by third-party app developers, it is tough to tap accurately on the tiny digital keys.

The larger display means bigger, easier-to-tap buttons and

menu titles so you don't accidentally stop your alarm when

you're trying to snooze it. It also makes room for up to 50

This new keyboard could be a game changer with Quick-Path though, the feature that gives users the ability to swipe to type. Even if you aren't precise, the on-device machine learning should figure out what you are trying to say and even suggest the next word based on context. Despite my skepticism around ease of use, I'm hopeful that a full keyboard on the Apple Watch will offer more autonomy from the iPhone.

QUICKER CHARGING WITH USB-C

I was disappointed that the new Apple Watch has the same all-day 18-hour battery life as the Series 6. However, the Series 7 has what Apple describes as a new fast charging architecture and comes with a brand-new USB-C cable for quicker charging. Although fast charging is only possible on the Series 7, you can still use the cable with other models. With the USB-C charger, the Series 7 can charge up to 80 percent in just 45 minutes. Apple also touts that spending just 8 minutes charging the watch is enough to track your sleep reliably all night long. While I wished for a bigger battery, I'm still excited to spend less time charging and more on the go.

NEW CASE COLORS & BAND OPTIONS

The new watch comes in five new aluminum colors: green, blue, red, starlight, and midnight. There are also stainless steel options available in silver, graphite, and gold. Plus,



there's a titanium case and new Nike and Hermes editions for even more diversity.

In addition to new watch colors, there is also an impressive color variety coming to the bands. The excellent news for band collectors is that the new watch model will be compatible with older bands in their respective sizes. While I'm surprised (and a little sad) that there won't be a purple Apple Watch to match the other new purple products, I am excited to explore the new accessories and will rely on them for the much-needed splash of color.

MORE DUST & CRACK RESISTANCE

The Apple Watch Series 7 doesn't just look better, it is also way more rugged. Although the watch is water resistant up to 50 meters (same as the Series 6), the new watch is more dust resistant and crack-proof. With an IP6X certificate for dust resistance, you can safely take your Apple Watch on even more adventures.

The Series 7 also boasts a more crack-resistant front crystal. This makes it harder to damage your screen, although I personally recommend using a screen protector when there's an expected risk of scraping or falling, which leads me to the next development!

NEW APPLE WATCH SERIES 7 FITNESS FEATURES

The Apple Watch Series 7 doesn't have any new fitness- or health-related sensors, but watchOS 8 brings many fitness features to the Apple Watch.

MAJOR CYCLING IMPROVEMENTS

The Apple Watch has long been able to track and map the popular activity of cycling. What is new is that advanced algorithms will be used to analyze GPS, heart rate, accelerometer, and gyroscope data to provide more metrics to cyclists. These include detecting that a ride has begun or has paused or that the rider fell and is unresponsive.

The Apple Watch is also better at measuring calories accurately even when the user is riding an e-bike. Plus, voice feedback will be given through AirPods, third-party Bluetooth headphones, or the watch's built-in speaker to announce workout milestones and the status of the Activity ring.

OTHER NEW ACTIVITY METRICS

Apple is adding more metrics to its fitness tracking repertoire. During the September announcement, we saw visuals of the Series 7 tracking the speed of a hit tennis ball, the distance of a golf swing, and the number of waves caught while surfing! I find these metrics truly impressive, but I

hoped for more new water sports. Especially since the Apple announcement showed off California's beautiful ocean land-scapes, I'm sad that activities like paddle boarding, snorkeling, and kayaking are still lacking.

APPLE FITNESS PLUS

Some notable changes are coming to Apple Fitness Plus, Apple's fitness subscription for Apple Watch users. There are new workouts, instructors, and time and difficulty options. One of the newest workouts is a series of weekly guided meditations based on themes such as gratitude or calmness.

A new feature lets you participate in Group Workouts with up to 32 other people via FaceTime's new content-sharing feature called SharePlay, even if they are scattered all over the world. Plus, your metrics and Activity rings can now be more easily seen on the screen and through voice feedback. As someone who finds motivation in competition, I'm excited about Group Workouts and can't wait to challenge my friends!

TWO NEW WATCH FACES

Two new watch faces are explicitly designed with the larger screen of the Series 7 in mind. They both take advantage of the larger display with refractive edges and are practical as well as aesthetically pleasing.

The Contour face offers a fluid animation of time throughout the day. The dial and numbers extend right to the edge of the display, bringing focus to the large display of the Apple Watch Series 7. The Modular Duo face lets you put not one but two large complications to the center of the watch face, even if both are data rich. I can't wait to add extra complications to my watch face as I prefer it to be informative rather than beautiful, although both is best.

If you've ever struggled to find an outlet in a coffee shop or planned to work on the plane only to realize that your laptop is close to dead, you'll understand why I love this power bank. It has a Qi wireless charger, 2 USB-A ports, a 65-watt AC outlet, and a 44,000mAh capacity, which means it can charge your MacBook more than once, along with any other devices or accessories you bring along. Plus, while it is powerful enough to jump-start a car, its sleek design means it looks right at home in any on-the-go

work setup.







Apple's obsession with eliminating ports makes a good USB-C hub an essential MacBook accessory. I've tried larger hubs, reasoning the more ports the better, but they take up a lot more space in my bag and on my desk and I rarely find myself needing more than the ethernet port, USB-C and USB-A ports, SD slot, and HDMI port in this six-in-one hub. This hub should work with any USB-C laptop.



Incase Commuter Backpack (\$99.95)

While slim in appearance, the Commuter backpack holds an astonishing amount of gear, including a 16-inch laptop. Web Editor Erin MacPherson recently put this backpack and the matching Accessory Organizer (\$44.95) to the test when she used them to transport her entire remote work setup to the iPhone Life office for a week on site. She found this well-constructed backpack comfortable to wear, even when loaded to capacity with a MacBook, iPad, mouse, full-size keyboard, laptop stand, and other essentials. Impressively, the bag still zipped shut with ease.







Cyezcor LED Video Light (\$19.99)

For a lot of us, remote work has meant endless video calls. And I'm surely not the only one who quickly tired of looking like a poorly lit zombie on-screen. My solution? This inexpensive ring light that clips on the top of my laptop screen, bathing me in an attractive glow without shining too brightly in my eyes. The USB-powered light can be adjusted to be cooler or warmer and brighter or softer, making it effective in most types of ambient lighting.

Satechi Slim X2 Bluetooth Backlit Keyboard (\$79.99) M1 Wireless Mouse (\$29.99)

This backlit keyboard is compact enough that I can fit it in my computer bag without a problem when I'm working away from the office, but still large enough that it has a number pad and is easy to type on. The M1 mouse is comfortable to use and small enough to slide right into my accessory bag. And because the mouse and keyboard come in the same space gray as my MacBook Air, they look great as part of my work setup.



FIND THE PAIR THAT'S RIGHT FOR YOU

EarFun Free Pro (\$59.99) Marketed as the "World's Smallest Active Noise Cancelling True Wireless Earbuds," the tiny size of the EarFun Free Pro offers solid sound and makes them a great fit for smaller ears. A variety of earbud tips means they can fit anyone looking for something less cumbersome though. They also offer an impressive battery life of up to 32 hours and fast charging options. The volume controls are fairly intuitive, and you can listen with just one earbud or share with a friend with Single Earbud Mode.





Anker Soundcore Liberty Air 2 Pro (\$128.99) It's hard to find a flaw in these earphones. Perhaps the best overall model, every feature these earbuds offer comes through in a big way. The overall sound is smooth and balanced, and you're treated to a very customizable experience through the Soundcore app. The earbuds keep track of your sound preferences and create a profile specifically for you, modifying settings as they see fit, but you can always go in and adjust them yourself. Add in the fact that they're lightweight and comfortable, and you have a winner.





These earbuds are my personal favorites. They fit snugly, offer a sealed-off sound without the need for constant readjustment, and don't hurt my ears even after hours of use. The sound itself is good quality right out of the box—no need to adjust any settings. You can, of course, choose your preferred settings in their app, but so far I haven't needed to. At seven hours, their battery life isn't quite as long as many competing brands and they don't support fast charging, but these guys are worth the wait.



Jabra Elite 45h On-Ear Headphones

(\$99.99)Confession: I don't always love noise cancellation. While I think it's a great feature, sometimes I want my sound to blend more organically with my environment, especially if I'm keeping an ear out for my toddler. The Jabra Elite 45h offers beautiful, immersive sound with passive noise reduction and a comfortable fit without blocking out the world around me. The large size fits comfortably without being too big, and the option to go wireless makes it perfect to use with my iPhone. The associated app offers customization options, and the battery is long-lasting and quick to charge.



Riwbox BT05 Bluetooth Kids Headphones (Starts at \$23.98) ◀

Finding the right headphones for your kids is an important task, especially considering their auditory health could be at stake. Riwbox offers many cute and affordable headphones for children, but the BT05 was our favorite. The design is delightful, but their best feature is the ability to switch from regular mode to kids mode, which has an 85 decibel limit, meaning your child can't turn up the volume high enough to damage their ears. They were a little big on my two-year-old, but even so she enjoyed many Raffi songs without them falling off.

Klipsch The Three (\$574)

This speaker not only has great sound quality but also has a lot of character. I was surprised by the potent bass response considering the speaker's small size. Pairing to my iPhone was a cinch. The Three comes with a remote control for adjusting the volume from across the room. The retro design is charming, and the physical controls are satisfying. While this unit's classic appearance might not be everyone's bag, the hi-fi sound, Bluetooth compatibility, and reasonable price make this a great home speaker, especially for bedrooms and home offices.



Bowers & Wilkins 606 S2 Standmount Loudspeaker (\$898) ◀

These award-winning speakers live up to their reputation. The audio quality is crisp with a comforting, organic warmth in the low end. Music, podcasts, TV, and movies will sound better than you would've thought possible with these high-fidelity speakers. Bowers & Wilkins recently re-released these beloved 25-year-old speakers with some improvements. These are passive speakers, meaning you will need an amplifier or receiver to use them. If you're looking for the gold standard in home sound systems for your entertainment center, I can't recommend these speakers enough.

Ikea Symfonisk Picture Frame Speaker (\$199)

There's nothing else on the market quite like the Symfonisk. I should clarify—this is not an actual picture frame. It's a piece of art that doubles as a home speaker with Wi-Fi. You can choose from a few different designs and can stock up on replacement designs for \$19.99 in case you wanted to have a few on hand. The Symfonisk is a collaboration with Sonos, meaning it has top-of-the-line compatibility with Apple AirPlay. The sound comes in mono, but you can pair it with another Symfonisk to create a stereo system.



Marshall Stockwell II (\$199.99) I enjoy this speaker so much. The first thing I noticed is the included brass and treble knobs, which seem to be very rare on portable speakers. They give you the freedom to guickly adjust your sound to fit any space. The bass response is exceptional for a speaker of this size, and the audio quality excels even at high volumes. The 20 hours of battery life and space-efficient design make this great for travel. The rustic design harkens back to Marshall's vintage guitar amps, but don't let the look deceive you; this speaker is an innovative piece of modern audio

technology.

Teenage Engineering OB-4 (\$599)

This beautiful little machine is the most unusual device I've ever reviewed. As a musician, I've been a fan of Teenage Engineering's synthesizers for years. The company calls the OB-4 the "Magic Radio," and it's an apt name to be sure. To my surprise, this device is not only a Bluetooth speaker with incredible sound quality, but also includes an FM radio, a looper, and a host of ambient effects. Hidden beneath its minimal Nordic design lies dozens of controls and functions best learned through playful curiosity. While it's clearly on the pricey side, this device would make a perfect gift for teenagers and young adults interested in electronics and musical performance.

House of Marley Get Together Duo (\$149.99)

There is more than meets the eye with these bookshelf speakers. They are designed to live in a stationary location like a desk, but one of the speakers is portable! I also appreciated that these speakers are made with natural bamboo and eco-friendly materials, plus they are packed in 100 percent recycled materials. Pairing wirelessly to my iPad was simple and quick. These speakers sound great, look attractive on the bookshelf, and are very reasonably priced for the quality.



Turtlebox (\$374)

This impenetrable speaker is designed for rugged, outdoor use. It's completely waterproof, dustproof, shockproof, and UV resistant, meaning you can throw it in the lake and then toss it into the sand with no fear of damaging it. The tough construction and 20-hour battery life make it perfect for tailgating or a day on the river. The sound employs a high-frequency curve designed to pierce through wind and distance. For that reason, I found this speaker sounded a lot better outside than inside. If you're looking for a gift for outdoorsy friends or family members, look no further!

Soundboks 3 (\$999)

If you want the biggest, loudest Bluetooth speaker on the market, look no further than the Soundboks 3. This portable speaker is massive in size and sound, making it an excellent wireless sound system for outdoor parties and big events. I'm particularly in love with the rechargeable battery and the futuristic way it slides in and out. The controls are easy to use and the connection panel offers input and output to more speakers. The removable front can be custom painted, which is a fun and thoughtful detail. You can even connect a microphone via XLR for karaoke!

A router that's optimized for use with Apple HomeKit is an absolute must-have as the backbone of your smart home. This system's HomeKit integration lets you limit the ability of your individual smart devices to access the internet—forcing all traffic through your encrypted HomeKit—while also putting an end to almost all "device not responding" errors. The three-node mesh network also extends your Wi-Fi well beyond what a single router could, bringing reliable connections to distant devices like a garage door opener or outdoor smart outlets.



Philips Hue White and Color Ambiance Starter Kit (\$199.99) _

The menu of HomeKit smart bulbs is long and getting longer, but reliability is still the most important metric and nobody beats Philips Hue for reliability. With the included hub, you can control up to 50 lightbulbs. Simply plug the hub into your router and add it to HomeKit—the bulbs pair with the hub and appears in the Home app just like any other device. The responsiveness, flexibility, and reliability of this system leave me saying: for smart bulbs, accept no substitutes.



Meross MSG200 Smart Wi-Fi Garage Door Opener (\$49.99)

This simple device will make basically any garage door voice-controlled. Setting it up only took me about 20 minutes, on a garage door that didn't even have a remote control, no less! Setting aside the satisfaction of saying "Open Sesame" to my iPhone and watching the door rattle up, it's quite handy to be able to check my phone to see whether the garage door is open or closed. This is especially useful when lots of people are coming or going, or if worried about losing airconditioning out the open door of an attached garage.



These hexagonal lights didn't seem like they were going to be a show-stopper, but once we had them set up, we fell in love. They emit a rich warm light that feels downright magical. The synthetic woodgrain has an organic quality that looks luxurious on the wall in a tasteful living room. Most statement lights in the HomeKit catalog create a sci-fi techie vibe like the movie Tron, but not these. The Nanoleaf Elements bring elegance to the room, but they can also pulse when you touch them or along with your music, so they'll still get the party started.


Etekcity ESF-551 Smart Fitness Scale (\$29.99) ◀

Nomad Leather Loop for AirTag (\$24.95) ◀



I lose two to three pairs of sunglasses over the course of a normal summer, so I was very excited to try out Nomad's Glasses Strap. The strap features a slot that you can easily pop your AirTag into, so even if you do manage to lose the glasses and the strap, you can easily track them down. It comes with several different attachments to fit the stems of your glasses, and while it might not be a seamless fit, it's pretty secure. So far this year, I'm still on my first pair of sunglasses.





At first this case made me nervous: It hangs upside down from its attached carabiner, and the top of the case is open. But I just traveled across the country with this case in tow, and my AirPods didn't escape once. I also verified that the case is drop-proof to a height of four feet when I dropped it on asphalt and my AirPods came out without a scratch. While advertised as waterproof, I didn't test it in the water: after peeling the top back to access my AirPods on a regular basis, the case got loose at the top. The case leaves access to the Lightning port and is compatible with wireless chargers.

Sharper Image Smart Pixel Art Creator – Ages 7+ (\$99.99) **4**



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




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WHO ARE THE APILE LEAKERS?

THE FACES BEHIND THE RUMORS

you keep a close eye on rumors of upcoming Apple devices and events, chances are you'll see the same names and publications come up again and again. But who are these so-called leakers and where do they get their information? Why do we consider them trustworthy sources? I did some digging on the people we put our trust in and learned some surprising things.

Rumor tracking site AppleTrack ranks 18 different people and websites by their Apple rumor accuracy. Here you'll find the four most compelling leakers and their track records, strengths, and weak points.

Each has an impressive history of accurate predictions and has their own method of gaining and sharing rumors. Let's get to know these leakers!

MARK GURMAN ACCURACY: 88.8%

Mark Gurman joined the tech scene as a teenager, starting off working for 9to5Mac. Since then, he's rapidly climbed the ladder all the way up to Bloomberg, where he regularly posts reports on what may be

coming down the Apple line. He holds an impressive fourth place overall in terms of accuracy, and is the most prolific of all the leakers. Where he gets his rumors is somewhat of a mystery, but we have to give the guy props for keeping his sources anonymous!

JON PROSSER ACCURACY: 74.3%

Jon Prosser is the reigning king of tech Twitter and YouTube, amusing and intriguing his followers with leaks, jokes, and wild antics. Last spring, he swore to his followers he would shave his eyebrows

if Apple didn't hold an event on March 23. Apple didn't, and sure enough, Jon's eyebrows went bye-bye. Interestingly, his accuracy has been tanking lately, leading some to suspect his sources may have gotten a talking-to. His Twitter makes it clear he is open to messages from anyone with information, so we can assume he gathers most of his intel that way.

MING-CHI KUO ACCURACY: 76.6%

Ming-Chi Kuo is an analyst for TF International Securities who gets his info from Apple's Asian supply chain, where the company produces its devices. While his reports aren't always 100 percent accurate,

he tends to stay in the ballpark of what we will or won't see with any given release. Two areas of strength for Kuo are scheduling and price point; look to him to find out when you'll see new devices and features and how much you'll be spending.

MAX WEINBACH ACCURACY: 68.8%

While Max Weinbach comes in last for accuracy in our roundup, he has another noteworthy accomplishment: he is only 20 years old. His leaks focus more on Android-related content, to the point that

he contributes regularly to blog Android Police. He gets his info by poking around on his own, seeing what info he can glean from just knowing where to look. In February of last year, he told Tom's Guide: "Every time I tweet or publish an

article about a device, I expect an email or phone call from the company about it." But at the time of interview, he still hadn't.

THE MAN BEHIND THE RENDERS

When Apple leakers release new information, they often accompany it with a render of what the new device might look like. One of the most well-known render leakers is Steve H. McFly, who shares from his account OnLeaks. According to AppleTrack, as of June 2021, OnLeaks had a 78.6 percent accuracy rate, including correct renders of the iPhone 11 Pro.

THE DARK SIDE OF LEAKING

One of the most accurate Apple leakers up until this point is a blogger called Kang who writes for Chinese site Weibo. Back in June of 2021, however, he posted that Apple's lawyers had contacted him telling him to stop. This brings us to one important fact: Apple doesn't like leaks.

While leaks can create buzz around new product releases, no company wants their products and plans released verbatim to the public. While some hints and half-truths can be beneficial, actual leaking of confidential information can be a serious matter. Recently, Apple reportedly sent a letter to a leaker warning them that misinformation prior to a launch could mislead third-party accessory creators, leading to incompatible product development.

This past spring, Apple actually sued a former employee for using inside information for his own personal gain, citing the employee "had used his seniority to gain access to internal meetings and documents . . and he provided these trade secrets to his outside media correspondent." A lawsuit leveled by a company as big as Apple could be potentially devastating to an individual, which shows just how serious the exchange of information can be.

Still, rumors are an exciting and important part of the Apple world, and many come from honest channels. Back in the spring of 2020, Apple accidentally confirmed the release of AirTags through a support video that included AirTags in a screenshot of a Settings menu. Eagle-eyed enthusiasts caught it, and thus we knew about AirTags well before their 2021 launch.

Leaking is tricky business. If you're wrong too much you lose credibility, but being right too much could spell legal trouble. But I believe leaking is a fundamental part of Apple's grand plan, as long as they can keep us guessing. Will these four champs continue to master the game? We'll be keeping an eye out, but I have a guess that no one leaker will stay on top for too long. $\textcircled{\bullet}$

NAVIGATING THE MYSTERIOUS WORLD OF SMARTPHONE PRIVACY BY ELISABETH GARRY



any of us have had a conversation with a friend, only to be scrolling on our phones later and come across an ad for the very thing we thought we'd been discussing in private. My colleague, Erin MacPherson, told me this story: "My mom was talking to me about wanting a side-by-side double trash can for

under her breakfast bar, and a few days later, I was seeing Amazon ads for exactly those. It was... freaky. Up until then, I had pretty much assumed that I'd forgotten about Googling something or looking it up on Amazon, but I was sure I hadn't with that one." Stories like this raise the question—is your iPhone spying on you?

In 2021, the debate over iPhone privacy has been blowing up on a major scale. Apple's new initiative to scan material on users' phones for potential child sexual abuse material (CSAM) was delayed after pushback from individuals and organizations concerned about the new policy's privacy and security implications. Edward Snowden, among others, spoke out on Twitter and published an article about Apple's plans to start scanning images intended for upload to iCloud and information exchanged using the Messages app for CSAM in collaboration with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC).

While this might sound like a noble pursuit—I think we can all agree that reducing the proliferation of CSAM online is of paramount importance—Snowden and others were concerned that, with this initiative, Apple would open a "back door" to abuses of privacy. If Apple were to scan and share your photos and encrypted messages, who's to say where this sharing would stop? What other types of images and messages might Apple decide are dangerous? Who else might the company be compelled to share your data with?

As Snowden writes, "...it really doesn't matter what Apple's claimed process protections are: once they create the capability, the law will change to direct its application. . . The bottom line is that once Apple crafts a mechanism [for] the mass surveillance of iPhones (no matter how carefully implemented), they lose the ability to determine what purposes it is used for."

The battle over privacy concerns regarding Apple's child safety protections comes in contrast to its efforts to stand out as the tech company most dedicated to preserving users' privacy. With the rollout of App Tracking Transparency in iOS 14.5, Apple threw the gauntlet at Facebook's feet, forcing the notorious data miner to announce its intention to track users and give them the option to opt out of tracking. The results weren't pretty for Facebook and other apps: 96 percent of iPhone users in the US refused to surrender their data. Since then, Apple has only continued to build its privacy protections with iOS 15, introducing iCloud Private Relay to help users browse more securely and expanding its Hide My Email feature to protect users' email addresses from spam and scammers.

So, which is it? Is Apple truly dedicated to protecting your

privacy, or is it opening you up to data mining and intrusive governmental overreach?

The answer to that question is: It's complicated. While Apple's plans to start doing client-side scanning to search for CSAM on users' iPhones has been delayed, the initiative has not been cancelled. According to a statement Apple made to Gizmodo: "Based on feedback from customers, advocacy groups, researchers and others, we have decided to take additional time over the coming months to collect input and make improvements before releasing these critically important child safety features."

If your iPhone can soon scan your iCloud-bound images and messages, what can it do now?

You should know that both native Apple apps (like the Camera app or Apple Maps) and third-party apps frequently collect data such as your location and can access your microphone and camera, depending on the permissions you set. Third-party apps may also use third-party trackers to collect data about users. Many apps will even collect information like your name, age, location, interactions on the app, and even your outside internet activity.

Apple's App Tracking Transparency feature makes it easier to limit the data third-party apps can collect on you, but depending on the terms you agreed to when you signed up for the app, it may not stop apps from collecting all of it. Keep in mind that many apps require permission to use your camera, microphone, and location to function. What good would navigating with Google Maps be if it didn't know where you were? Wouldn't it be a lot harder to post a story to Instagram if it didn't have access to your camera? Well, according to a lawsuit filed in September 2020, Instagram (which is owned by Facebook) was sued for allegedly accessing users'

cameras even when the users were not actively using Instagram.

This lawsuit, filed by Brittany Conditi on behalf of herself and other Instagram users, alleges that Instagram accesses users' cameras even when the Instagram camera feature is not in use "for one main reason: to collect lucrative and valuable data on its users that it would not otherwise have access to." The suit goes on to say, "By obtaining extremely private and intimate personal data on their users, including in the privacy of their own homes, [Facebook is] able to increase their advertising revenue by targeting users more than ever before."

According to The Fashion Law, a media company following (you guessed it) legal aspects of the fashion industry, Conditi dropped her lawsuit in 2021, which The Fashion Law claims is "likely the result of a confidential settlement between the parties." This means that we may never know what Facebook admitted to in the settlement and what they denied, but earlier in 2020, Facebook did address an Instagram "bug" that

gave the app access to users' cameras even when they were not using the app.

Interestingly, Conditi's suit specifically credits Apple's iOS 14—which sends notifications to users when a third-party app accesses their cameras or microphones—with exposing Instagram's alleged improper use of users' cameras. That's a point in Apple's favor, and so is Security.org's rating of A+ for Apple's data collection policies. According to Aliza Vigderman, tech journalist and Security. org's Content Manager, your data is much safer with an iPhone than with an Android phone. "Google collects much more information than Apple," she says.

But what about my colleague Erin MacPherson's story of

suddenly receiving ads for a product she'd only spoken privately with her mother about? The ads Erin saw appeared on Facebook. How could Amazon and Facebook have known that Erin talked to her mother about fancy new side-by-side trash cans unless her phone told them?

Well, there is a (somewhat) innocent explanation. According to Rex Freiberger, CEO of the tech publication Gadget Review, "This is the result of advanced algorithms that definitely do track your online activity but aren't listening in on you." You see, Erin is Facebook friends with her mom, and while Erin may not have searched online for side-by-side trash cans, her mother did. As we've gone over, apps like Facebook can pinpoint your location, so they might be able to see that Erin and her mother are friends who are frequently in the same place—maybe the same house. So, if Facebook knew to serve Erin's mother ads about side-by-side trash cans based on her search history, it might have known to serve Erin those ads as well, as she also spent a lot of time in a household that was in the market for said trash cans.

Freiberger goes on to say that noticing ads for things we were just talking about is also likely "a result of confirmation bias." How many conversations do we have daily, and how many ads do we see? Every time there's an overlap, we might jump to the conclusion that it's the result of our iPhones recording our conversations, especially if we're already concerned about our phones spying on us.

If this explanation doesn't satisfy you, you're not alone. It doesn't help that, of course, companies like Facebook don't want anyone to know the breadth of the data they collect and how they're doing it. For its part, Facebook has been very clear that it does not use your phone's microphone to listen in on your conversations. Apple also denies using iPhone microphones or cameras to spy on users, but this is cold comfort for those who worry about their privacy when they have an iPhone in the room with them.

The good news is, you're not totally helpless when it comes to protecting your data. If you want to minimize the

amount your iPhone apps can

Most of the more mysterious and intrusive data mining comes from third-party apps, not Apple apps. Before installing a new app from the App Store, make sure to look the developer up, read reviews, check the permissions it requires, and read the terms of service (yes, I know). Vigderman

stresses the importance of managing which apps you allow to track you: "Whenever you are asked if an app can track you,

You should also remember: If you're not paying for a product, you are the product. Nowhere is this truer than in the world of apps. **U**



track you: Turn off tracking for apps using the App Tracking Transparency feature and turn off Location Services either for your entire iPhone or on an app-by-app basis. Mask your email address with the Hide My Email feature when you sign up for apps. Check to see which apps have permission to use your microphone and camera and disallow those you don't trust. Most importantly, do your research on the apps that you install on your iPhone.



TOP 4 REASONS WHY I DON'T USE SIGN IN WITH APPLE

THERE'S A BETTER WAY TO CREATE AND MANAGE YOUR ACCOUNTS

hen Apple debuted its Sign in with Apple service, I wrote about how excited I was to use it. With Apple's new single sign-on service, you just push a button and easily log into that site without the hassle of a

username and password. Apple stakes its brand on security, and all indications were that Sign in with Apple would be another great offering in a lineup of solid security and privacy-oriented services. That's all still true. It is secure, private, and when it works, convenient. Nevertheless, I don't use it and I believe there's a better way. Here's why:

YOU HAVE TO REMEMBER YOU USED IT

A year and a half after Sign in with Apple launched, I'm sitting at my desk staring blankly at a sign-in page for an old messenger platform I used briefly last year. What was that password? I just want to recover a cat pirate meme that would be perfect for today's Twitter rant.

Just as I set my fingers to the keys, I notice the buttons to sign in with Google, Facebook, or Apple, offered like three cups upside down on a table. My access to this cat meme is behind one of those buttons, but I can't remember which. Is it just my imagination, or is someone in the background shuffling those cups around with a wink and a smirk? "Pick a cup, any cup, which hides the ball?" I'm in a hurry. This isn't that important. I tap the email and password option hoping that iCloud keychain has my credential stored, but it doesn't. Then I take a shot at the Google button. I use Google a lot. It seems like a safe bet. At first, it appears to work: the sign-in page gives way, its doors open, admitting me into the chat app, but something's wrong.

YOU CAN MISTAKENLY CREATE MULTIPLE ACCOUNTS

Instead of signing me in, Sign in with Google created an entirely new account. No memes here. If you're experiencing confusion at this stage, let me assure you, so was I. What happened was actually simple: I'd never used Sign in with Google with that chat app. So, instead of logging me into an existing account, the button created a new account for me. There was text on the screen during my sign-in process that told me I was creating a new account instead of logging in to an old one, but I didn't read it. I was in a hurry. Aren't we always in a hurry when we're trying to log in? With a sigh, I log out and return to the sign-in page.

Alright, no problem, I've used Sign in with Facebook too. Tap that button, and three clicks later, I'm the annoyed owner of a second blank new useless profile.

The third time's the charm? Finally, I try out Sign in with Apple. It doesn't work either, but at least this time I go slowly enough to notice the text telling me that I'm making a new account.

I'm still not logged in, and now I'm annoyed. Single sign-on services are designed to be more convenient than a regular username and password, but, like a password, a button is only as functional as my ability to remember which one to use. With hundreds of websites and services to log in to, I will not remember which button I pushed to create my account. I'm the first problem with Sign in with Apple. I'm playing my own cup game scam, and I'm the victim; I've hidden my credential from myself.

The second problem is how logging in to an existing account and creating an entirely new one are practically identical processes. There are some indicators that you're making a new account, but I was in a hurry, so I got two new accounts instead of a cat meme.

They could make it a little easier on me by popping up a banner right away saying: "We don't detect any account associated with this service, would you like to create one?"

3 IT ISN'T UNIVERSALLY AVAILABLE

The solution to this game is to use the same single sign-on service every time. That way, you will always know which button to push to get in. But there's a problem: some websites offer Sign in with Apple, but most don't. On some pages you see it, on most pages you don't.

To be fair, this isn't just Apple's problem: no single sign-on

service is available on every site or app, so you cannot use any of them every single time. But Apple's version is even less available than the rest. As of this writing, the number of services that offer Sign in with Apple is still limited to the most popular apps, and not even all of them. That means even if you pick Sign in with Apple as your one true solution, it's likely to stand you up just when you need it most. You'll still be using other options more often than not.

There's another disappearing act related specifically to Apple's service. I thought that when I created my account with Sign in with Apple, it would store an email and password combo in iCloud Keychain, but it doesn't. To clarify the difference between the two: iCloud Keychain is Apple's password manager, which will suggest and store secure passwords for websites. Sign in with Apple is the button that skips the whole username password process by linking your account with your Apple ID. Apple says that the two services are connected, and that is true in a technical way, but not in the practical way I expected. If you've created an account with Sign in with Apple, then that account will not appear in your list of saved websites and services in iCloud Keychain. Meaning, if you put your cursor in the email and password boxes on that website, then iCloud Keychain will not suggest your username and password. The only way to get back in to that account is to click the Sign in with Apple button. You can use iCloud Keychain and Sign in with Apple side by side, but then you'll be back to guessing which one you used every time you're asked to sign in.

A PASSWORD MANAGER WORKS BETTER

Fortunately, there is a much better option that's always available and won't let you down.

Use a password manager. Password managers like OnePassword, LastPass, Keeper, Microsoft Authenticator, Chrome, and Apple's iCloud Keychain all work fantastically to create and store unique (and secure, if used correctly) username and password combos. You will only need to sign on once in a single place: your password manager. This fulfills the concept of a 'single sign-on,' except it's always available and it won't create a new empty account in three clicks. Your password manager should always be by your side. It might take a little extra work to go copy and paste a password, but it's worth it.



million users and counting, Forest has planted over a million trees so far!




YOUR SUSTAINABLE LIVING COACH





NEW IPHONE? HERE'S HOW TO SET IT UP

11 STEPS TO GET YOUR NEW IPHONE UP AND RUNNING

etween the holidays and the new iPhone line, people around the world are purchasing new devices. Getting a new iPhone is super exciting, but it can be a little intimidating, especially if you haven't owned one before. If you have an old iPhone that works, the setup tends to be much simpler, but if your old one is out of commission or if you're making the switch from Android, you might want some guidance on this daunting process. I'll walk you through the steps to getting your new phone up and running, including how to activate a new iPhone and set up a carrier or provider.

SET UP YOUR CARRIER & SERVICE

Remember, your phone won't be able to make calls right out of the box. Calls require a SIM card from a carrier (or a digital SIM). You may have purchased your phone from Wal-Mart or Best Buy; the Apple website; an online store like eBay; or directly from the carrier of your choice.

If you've already set up an account with your carrier to establish your cellular service, then you can visit your carrier's store or call them to have them assign you a phone number and activate your account. Learning how to activate an iPhone without a SIM card is possible, but it is unnecessarily difficult.

Note: The iPhone X series or later, including all of the iPhone 13 line, supports Dual SIM using a nano-SIM and an eSIM. This means your phone can support two separate data plans. To learn more about your eSIM and set it up, talk to your cell carrier company.

POWER UP!

The very first thing you'll want to do is power on your device.



Turn on your iPhone by pressing down and holding the Side button (unless you have the iPhone SE, in which case you will press and hold the Sleep/Wake button along the top of your device).



You'll see "Hello" in many languages appear on your screen. If it doesn't, that means you need to charge your phone first.

START THE SETUP



When the Quick Start menu pops up (after you've selected the language you want to use and the region where you live), you will need to select Set Up Manually, unless you have another working iPhone nearby with your Apple account all set up. Enter your Wi-Fi information to continue the process and review the Data & Privacy disclaimer.

SET UP TOUCH ID OR FACE ID



Depending on which iPhone model you have, you will then have one of two authentication options to set up: Face ID or Touch ID. Newer iPhone models have Face ID while older models have Touch ID.

If you have a model with a Home button, you will have the option to set up Touch ID, a feature that allows you to unlock your iPhone with your fingerprint. Set this up by repeatedly placing your finger on your Home button.

If you have an iPhone without a Home button, you will have the option to set up Face ID, which allows you to unlock your phone with—you

guessed it—your face! Set this up by holding your iPhone in


front of your face and following the prompts.


If at any time your iPhone doesn't register your fingerprint or your face, no worries. You can still enter a passcode, which you will set up after you've set up Touch ID/Face ID.

Touch ID and Face ID do more than just unlock your device. You can use them to make purchases with Apple Pay and even open apps with sensitive information, like your banking app or journaling app. It's a great feature that we definitely recommend. However, you can also opt out of Touch ID/Face ID and just use a passcode.

CREATE YOUR PASSCODE

When it's time to create your passcode, you'll be given the option to create a six-digit passcode. If six digits is too many for you to remember or seems too few for your preferred security level, then you can choose another option.











Tap Passcode Options.



Select one of the following:

Four-Digit Numeric Code (the least secure)


Custom Numeric Code (this is the same six-digit code)

Custom Alphanumeric Code (the most secure)

I recommend choosing an at least six-digit code. Especially If you've enabled Touch ID or Face ID, you won't need to enter it often and it will provide increased security. Whichever passcode option you pick, you'll be prompted to re-enter the passcode on the next screen.

SET UP YOUR APPLE ID

It's time to log in to your iPhone with an Apple ID. If you don't have one, then we'll create one.









- On the Apps & Data screen, you'll see a few different options. If this is your first iPhone, you will need to select **Don't Transfer Apps & Data**.
- You'll be prompted to enter your Apple ID and password. If you don't have one yet, select **Forgot**Password or **Don't Have an Apple ID**.

Creating an Apple ID and an Apple ID password are essential parts of being an iPhone user. It is the account that gives you access to all of Apple's services, including the iTunes and App Store, Apple's free text and video messaging services (iMessage and FaceTime), and the Find My network to help you locate your misplaced or stolen phone. It also allows you to access Apple's cloud storage system, iCloud.

- Select Create a Free Apple ID.
- After entering your name and birthday, choose your Apple ID, which is always an email address. I recommend choosing an email account that you use frequently and won't forget.
- When picking a password, choose something with a combination of upper and lowercase letters, numbers, and symbols. This password is for your Apple ID, which is shared across Apple devices.



Once you've set it up, a verification text will be sent to your phone. Enter the code from the text and enter your Apple ID and password to complete the process.

Later, once your iPhone is set up, you'll be asked to enter your Apple ID and password on your iPhone. Then you'll see your ID account located along the top when you open your Settings app.

While it's simple to retrieve a forgotten Apple ID or password, it's inconvenient, and you'll be asked for both frequently. Make sure to store your login credentials in a password manager (see page 76 for recommendations).

HOW TO ENABLE SIRI & OTHER SERVICES

Finally, you'll be asked to enable a few more of Apple's services:

- Apple's password manager: iCloud Keychain
- Apple's digital assistant Siri
- Apple Pay
- Screen Time
- Automatic app updates
- And more!

Set up whatever features you like. You can enable or disable any of them later if you change your mind. And that's it! You've set up your new iPhone. You'll see your Home screen and all the built-in apps. Some of Apple's apps may have to download from the App Store, which they'll do automatically. They'll appear dark as they download, but in a few short minutes, your iPhone will be ready to go.

Now you've activated your new iPhone and set it up. Next, you can begin personalizing and using it as you please. Enjoy your new iPhone! (1)


Get into Focus Mode

Explore the World in 3D

Hide Your Email from Websites

Have you been seeing Safari suggestions or notifications about hiding your email address? If you're an iCloud storage plan subscriber, you now have automatic access to the Hide My Email feature. Just tap Hide My Email when it pops up and you'll see a randomized email address to use as a "shell"

address. Tap continue or the refresh icon to choose a different one. Tap Use and you're good to go!



Cut Out FaceTime Background Noise with Voice Isolation

If you've ever tried to FaceTime in a noisy location, you know that the FaceTime call sound can leave a lot to be desired. iOS 15 aims to fix that by offering a Voice Isolation, which makes your voice stand out even in noisy settings. Just open FaceTime, swipe down from the top right corner of your screen, tap Mic Mode, then select Voice Isolation. Enjoy!



FaceTime Your Non-iPhone Friends

FaceTime is a great way to talk to family and friends, but if you've ever wanted to video chat with an Android user, up until now you've had to look into other apps. iOS 15 has solved this problem! Just open FaceTime, create a link to send to your non-Android contact, have them open it, and start your chat. Simple!



Swipe Through Safari

iOS 15 is bringing a ton of improvements to Safari, but one of the easiest, most intuitive changes is you can now navigate between Safari tabs just by swiping left or right at the bottom of your screen. Swiping left of your last tab will open your Safari Start page.



Update Your Memoji

iOS 15 lets you update your Memoji to include things like over 40 new outfits, stickers with new poses, two different colored eyes, and three new accessibility options: cochlear implants, oxygen tubes, and a soft helmet. Just update your Memoji as you would in the past, and enjoy all the new offerings!

were a popular addition to the iPhone in iOS 14, and now they've come to the iPad! To add one to your Home screen, just long press on a blank part of the desired page, then tap the plus button when in jiggle mode. Choose your desired widget, select its size, then tap Add Widget to put it on your Home screen.



Use Live Text in Photos and Your Camera

APPLE PRIVACY TIPS

TOP 10 WAYS TO KEEP YOUR IPHONE SECURE

pple has been making a visible effort to up its privacy game, now requiring app developers to list what data they track and how they use that data in the App Store, and even allowing you the option to opt out of ad tracking entirely. While these improvements are exciting and add to every iPhone user's peace of mind, there's actually a lot more you can do to keep your data safe. Here are some of the best ways you can increase your iPhone privacy just by switching some settings.

1. Change Your Facebook Privacy Settings

Facebook is notorious for tracking its users. Still, many of us like to use the social platform to stay in touch with friends and loved ones, so even though we might feel conflicted, many of us still use it on a regular basis.

Fortunately, Facebook offers a Privacy Checkup that lets you see things like who can see what you share, your data settings, your ad preferences, and more. By performing this checkup, you can adjust any settings to what feels right to you.

2. Deactivate or Delete Facebook

For many, even with the Privacy Checkup, Facebook is too big a privacy concern. Deleting Facebook entirely can certainly address this, but just deleting the app from your iPhone won't do the trick. You're going to want to delete your Facebook account entirely or deactivate it if you suspect you might want to come back later. Deleting it will erase your account completely, while deactivating it will take it down until such a time as you decide to reactivate it.

3. Hide Notification Previews

When notification previews pop up on your iPhone, frequently people around you will be able to see them as well. If you're having a sensitive conversation, or perhaps trying to surprise a friend or family member, you might not want people around you to see your texts or other notifications. Turning off notification previews can save you this worry, and give you an added level of privacy.

4. Opt Out of Ad Tracking

Your apps are always tracking you, trying to figure out what you like and don't like so they can deliver you the most targeted ads possible. Fortunately, Apple now allows you to opt out of ad tracking on apps, so they cannot track you across your other iPhone apps and the web to find out what makes you tick. While Apple has made this a standard for everyone, some app developers have yet to roll out this option.

5. Turn Off Personalized Ads

Whether or not you have personalized ads enabled on your iPhone, Apple will show you the same amount of ads, so some people actually prefer to have personalized ads enabled so what they see is of more interest to them. However, others don't like the feeling of Apple tracking their iPhone habits and using that information to try to sell things to them. If this is the case, you can turn off personalized ads, giving you a bit more anonymity in the cyber world.

6. Set Up Two-Factor Authentication

Two factor authentication makes it so when there is a sign in attempt using your Apple ID on a new device, a notification will be sent to one of your other devices. You will have to verify that sign-in attempt, otherwise the new device won't be able to sign in using your ID. This means that if you get a new iPhone you'll be able to sign in easily (as long as your old device is nearby) but others won't be able to log into your Apple ID on their device without your knowledge or permission. Newer iPhones come with this automatically enabled, but if you have an older iPhone or iOS, it's good to

manually set up two-factor authentication.

7. Use iCloud Keychain to Create & Store Strong Passwords

iCloud Keychain is Apple's native password manager, offering an easy way to maximize your personal security. Many of us use the same one, two, or three passwords for pretty much everything just because it's so difficult to remember more than that. iCloud Keychain not only stores your passwords so you don't have to remember them but actually suggests strong, unique passwords so you don't have to think of them yourself. All you have to do is remember your Apple ID passcode and/or enable Face ID or Touch ID and you'll be able to access all your passwords at any time.

8. Turn Off Location Services

Location services on your iPhone can have all sorts of handy features, like helping you navigate and letting you map where photos were taken. But, if privacy is your goal, it's not a great thing to have on. Luckily, you can turn off location services pretty easily, and turn it back on if you change your mind later. You can also go through app by app and choose which ones you will allow access to your location, and when (Always, When using the App, or Never), allowing you to customize your GPS experience.

9. Erase Text Messages Automatically

Not only can text messages take up our storage space, they can also provide privacy risks if they stick around too long or end up in the wrong hands. You can set your iPhone to automatically delete text messages after 30 days or one year, freeing up storage and giving you peace of mind if you forget to remove any conversation that you don't want to keep forever.

10. Update Apps Automatically

This one may seem counterintuitive, but hear me out. Letting apps update without your explicit consent might feel like a privacy violation, but the truth is updates frequently address privacy issues and can patch certain holes in security. By setting up apps to update automatically, you can rest easy knowing that you always have the latest privacy features the app has to offer. If you don't update, you might find yourself at risk of security breaches, and other malicious happenings. Plus, if the app isn't worth updating, it might be worth deleting. **U**



CHECK STEPS IN THE ACTIVITY APP

Your Apple Watch has a simple step tracker that also lets you track walking distance. You can see the steps and distance on the Apple Watch pedometer.



Press the Home button (Digital Crown) to see all your apps on your Home screen.

Open the Activity app.

Scroll down using the Digital Crown or with your finger and see your steps under TOTAL STEPS. You can also see the distance you have traveled under TOTAL DISTANCE.

Now you know how to check steps on Apple Watch!
Next, I'll show you how to view them on your Apple
Watch face.



ADD STEPS TO YOUR APPLE WATCH FACE

To see your steps directly on your watch face for quick reference and the extra boost of motivation, you need to use an Apple Watch complication. Unfortunately, the Activity app complication doesn't include your Apple Watch steps, only your activity rings that reflect your Move, Calorie, and Stand goals.

You'll have to download a third-party app to do this; my favorite is **Pedometer++** (free). Other pedometers may have similar complications, but this one is free and easy to navigate. It also offers several ways to see your steps on your Apple Watch face.


DOWNLOAD THE PEDOMETER++ COMPLICATION ON YOUR IPHONE


If apps downloaded on your iPhone are set to appear on your Apple Watch automatically, you can download the Pedometer++ using your iPhone. Here's how:

Open the App Store.

Tap Search.

Type Pedometer++ in the search bar.









- Tap GET.
- Once it is downloaded, open the Watch app.
- Under the My Watch tab, tap on the watch face you want to add the complication to.
- Under Complications, select the location you want the complication to go. Pedometer ++ offers complications in various sizes so they can go in almost every spot.
- Scroll down to PEDOMETER and pick the data you want to see. Steps & Distance is a great choice.
- If you tap More... you will see many other types of complications. There may be different options depending on the size of complication the particular watch face allows.

Keep in mind that not all watch faces can have complications. Infograph Modular is my go-to, but you can browse other Apple Watch faces too.

DOWNLOAD THE PEDOMETER++ COMPLICATION ON YOUR APPLE WATCH

You can use your Apple Watch to download the **Pedometer++** app and set up the complication to show steps on your watch face (though I think it's a little easier to do from your iPhone!). Here's how:










- Press the Digital Crown on your Apple Watch to see all your apps on your Home Screen.
- Open the Apple Store app.
- Search for Pedometer++.
- You can use your voice to speak the app name or write it using scribble.
- Scroll down until you see Pedometer++ and tap GET. Since I have the app's data saved on iCloud, I see the download from the iCloud symbol instead of GET.
- Return to your watch face. You can do this by pressing the Home button.
- Tap and hold the display until it zooms out and you see two buttons at the bottom.
- Tap Edit.
- Depending on the watch face, you may need to swipe left or right to get to the complications options. On Infograph Modular, you can tap the area where you want to put the complication.
- Scroll down to Pedometer and pick the option you want to see. I prefer Steps & Distance.
- It will save automatically, or you can press the Home button.

DID YOU KNOW?

If your watch runs out of battery on a walk, your iPhone step counter will continue to count your steps using the Pedometer++ app.

HOW TO MANUALLY ADD STEPS TO APPLE WATCH

"Help, my pedometer app is not working!" Unfortunately, even the best step counter app or your Apple Watch itself will glitch and may not record your steps accurately. Even if you use a third-party step tracker app, there may be times when you want to manually add your steps to the Health app on your iPhone:

- Open the Health app.
- Tap Browse.
- Search for Steps and select it.
- Tap Add Data.

- Type the number of steps you want to add. You can also change the date and time of your entry.
- Tap Add and then Confirm.

PRO TIP

The maximum number of steps that you can manually add at once is 90,000. Depending on the step counter app you use, these steps may not sync up and show on your Apple Watch face.

So does the Apple Watch count steps? Yes, and now you know how to count walking steps on Apple Watch and see them directly on your watch face! Even though your built-in iPhone pedometer can measure steps, it does not offer a complication for your watch face. Pedometer++ is not only a step counter, it is also a distance tracker app. It can help you reach 10,000 steps every day and track the miles (or kilometers) you walked! Next, learn how to see total calories on Apple Watch! **७**

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HOW TO CHECK RAM ON A MAC TO SEE WHICH APPS ARE SLOWING IT DOWN

IS YOUR COMPUTER RUNNING SLOWLY? CHECK YOUR RAM USAGE TO DETERMINE THE CAUSE AND FIX IT.


e all like to blame Wi-Fi when our computers are lagging, but when did you last check your Mac RAM usage? Seemingly innocent apps running in the background can consume large portions of your Mac's active memory. We'll cover how to check RAM usage with the Activity Monitor, plus a few tips on how to free up RAM.

Simply put, RAM (Random Access Memory) is short-term memory, where active processes occur. This means the many Safari tabs and apps you probably have open (like I do) are all using some amount of active memory. When your RAM usage is close to its limit, your computer will struggle with tasks and run more slowly.


Let's walk through how to check how much RAM you're using with the Mac Activity Monitor.



1. Press F4 on your keyboard or click on the Launchpad to open it.



2. Search for the Activity Monitor app or find it in your apps list and click to open it.




- 3. Select the Memory tab at the top.
- **4.** The display at the bottom of the screen will show a breakdown of total RAM usage.

Physical Memory: The amount of RAM installed.

Memory Used: The amount of RAM currently in use.

5. If you find an unused app that's still open and you want to close it to free up memory, select the app and click the X button in the upper-left corner of the screen.



6. Click Quit to confirm, and the file or app will be closed.

QUICK TIPS TO REDUCE MAC RAM USAGE


While there are memory-cleaner apps available, checking your RAM usage from time to time and taking the simple ac-

tion steps below should be enough to keep you from exceeding your RAM limit.

- Declutter your desktop. Did you know your Mac treats each item saved on your desktop as an active window? Saving on your desktop implies the need for quick access. You might be surprised at the difference when you move many of those files into folders!
- Quit inactive apps. This might seem obvious, but have you ever closed a file only to realize later that the application itself is still running? (I'm looking at you, Microsoft Excel!) Check to make sure the application has actually closed and isn't running in the background.
- Close unnecessary browser tabs. Do you have a lot of web resources that you frequently open and use? So do I! Bookmarking these pages and opening them only when needed will make you feel more organized and can also significantly reduce your RAM usage.


uring the pandemic, I started a poem-a-day challenge via email with my grandmother, and it quickly snowballed into an extended-family affair, with cousins of every level, great-aunts, and relatives I wasn't even sure I knew the word for joining in. The past year or two certainly challenged us to find new ways to connect, but more than that, it highlighted the importance of connection. Creating a family tree can serve a similar purpose as my family's poetry challenge, reaching out through a family's different branches, discovering people we may not have known about, and providing an activity to bond over. As families continue to reunite, family trees offer practical value as well, helping manage guest lists and reminding you of your third-cousin's name and who their parents are.

Over the years, family tree and heritage tracking technology has not only progressed at a rapid pace, but it's become increasingly widely available. More information is recorded than ever before, and these records are getting more and more accessible. While you may have heard about a friend paying for an extensive DNA test to find out more about their ancestry (or even done it yourself!), there are many more options for those searching for their roots. A lot of them are free, or much less expensive than ordering a whole DNA test, though many do partner with those kinds of tests if that's up your alley.

With so many resources out there, it can be hard to find the best fit for you. We've found the five best apps for the family-minded researcher. All of them have a free version, though many offer premium options, so you can decide your own investment level. If you need help getting started with your family tree, lots of these have step-by-step instructions that can guide you through an otherwise complicated

process. Many are linked to genealogy websites that offer additional resources and options.

BEST FAMILY TREE APPS




Ancestry: Your Family Story

(Free)

Perhaps the most comprehensive of family tree apps, Ancestry gives you the option of building a family tree by connecting your family member entries to public records, building an in-depth picture of your ancestry. Ancestry also offers a send-in DNA test (starting at \$99) that pairs with the **AncestryDNA** app, which can tell you even more about your

more about your genealogy and heritage. There's plenty to do with just the basic app, though!


FamilySearch Tree (Free)

FamilySearch Tree allows you to build a family tree in a similar way to Ancestry. However, it relies a lot on users entering information manually and does not offer the same extensive database as Ancestry, but you do have the option to add memories to people or relationships you enter. You're able to add photos, written memories, and voice recordings to an entry, giving your family tree an even more personal twist. For an app entirely focused on personal memories and family stories, check out its sister app, FamilySearch Memories.

MyHeritage - Family Tree (Free)

MyHeritage is another app that lets you build your family tree through manual entries. The premium version (starting at \$129/year with a firstyear discount of \$89) offers public records to help you find family members, but the free version relies on you doing it yourself. A very cool feature of the free version is the photo colorization and animation feature. Upload a photo of any family member and see it turned into a blinking, moving video, which can offer a new richness to old photos. MyHeritage also offers a DNA evaluation (\$79) for

those interested in learning more about their roots.



Find A Grave

(Free)

While this isn't strictly a family tree-building app, this app created by Ancestry is a great resource for those looking to connect with their ancestors. Find A Grave allows you to search for family members' graves all throughout the US, and possibly discover ones vou didn't know about. It seems to be mostly sourced from members, so you can upload your own pictures of headstones. You can also create memorials for loved ones who have passed away.



TreeView

(Free)

If you're looking to create a family tree that lives outside its app of origin, such as for a school project, a website, or even something just to hang on your wall, TreeView is the way to go. Each entry has the option to add facts, notes, and images, and it is the most easily shareable, whether on social media or if you want to print it. I would recommend Treeview to anyone who wants a physical family tree, for personal purposes or bigger projects, like for school or work. **ம**

travel a lot, for both work and pleasure. I attend industry trade shows and take trips with my family everywhere from Europe to the Middle East to Asia. I'm writing this from my hotel in Disney World, where I'm visiting my daughter who works at the park. With my role as my family's unofficial travel agent, I do a lot of research and have found that I can plan an entire vacation on iOS.

BOOKING THE TICKETS

Booking tickets can be a hassle, especially if you aren't confident that you're getting the best service or deals. If you have a preferred airline you like to stick with, their app frequently will offer extra goodies, as well as a smooth way to manage your booking. My family tends to make a lot of changes when we travel, so **Southwest** is our preferred airline, with no change fees and two free checked bags.

I prefer the mobile site to the app. One "gotcha" to be aware of when logging in to the app is that it defaults to your identity as the traveler, so you'll have to be diligent about changing the name, birthday, and gender for each traveler.

Another airline website I've been using recently is Frontier (FlyFrontier.com). They have rates that can be so low, you might pay more for parking at the airport! Seriously, I booked my last flight for \$52 and most of that was taxes.

I will often use an aggregator service like **Kayak** or **Priceline**. Priceline has proven valuable several times because they let you cancel within 24 hours, regardless of the carrier's policy. I have found they let you cancel until midnight the next day, so that could really be 28 hours or longer, depending on what time of day you made your reservation

ONCE YOU'RE ON YOUR WAY

Once the planning is done, you can now look forward to the trip itself. That's more fun to plan, anyway! On travel days, I'm paranoid about my phone running out of battery life. Bring a power bank so you don't end up without your mobile boarding pass.

Your next step is to make sure you have all of your movies downloaded on your mobile device. On this most recent trip, I forgot to do that and they had expired on my **Netflix** download queue. I ended up using the Southwest app to watch a movie from their in-flight selection of movies, and it was one that wasn't yet available on any streaming service, so that actually worked out. But make sure you have the app from the airline installed before you board!

Make sure you have a compatible set of headphones, ideally with noise cancellation. Now that Apple has abandoned the headphone jack, you either need the right adaptor or a wireless headset. Make sure it's charged too. I bring a portable battery pack and these days I need to be sure I have one that can charge my Lightning devices and my USB-C devices. One day we'll have a consistent cable format but

we're not there yet. We don't even have a universal wireless charging format, so I have to bring a different charger for my Apple Watch, too!

When you do finally get to your destination, you may need the use of other apps for transportation and navigation. Because I travel so much, I was a Hertz Gold Club member for decades, but I can't remember the last time I rented a car. Now that we have Uber and Lyft, I don't think I'd go back. Obviously, you'll want to download one or both of those apps, but consider **CityMapper**. In the cities it supports, it can give you all of the options available on one app, with expected timing. This way you can see which ridesharing service is more affordable as well as see bikes, scooters and public transportation, which helped me navigate the subway in New York City and "The Tube" in London. Unfortunately, at press time, the service doesn't support Orlando.

If you're heading to a destination like **DisneyWorld**, as I often do, you will definitely want, and dare I say, need, their official app. You can use it for everything from opening your hotel door to ordering food for pickup (which has been the only way to dine, during COVID times) to seeing theme park wait times and making ride reservations. You can even pay for goods and services with the app, which is important as Disney has halted free MagicBands, their wrist-based Near Field Communications based identifier. You can always buy MagicBands to pay for merchandise and open your hotel door but the app is becoming your "Key to the Kingdom!"

The dependence upon apps and therefore your phone is another reminder to keep your phone well-charged. FuelRod is a handy offering found in numerous destinations and airports. These kiosks let you purchase a fully charged compact battery pack, with cables for most smartphones, but more importantly, you can swap your depleted FuelRod with a fully charged one. My daughter depends on her FuelRod to keep her phone charged after working a long day at Disney and then enjoying the parks at night.

I remember graduating college in 1988 and driving across the country to visit a friend. I had nothing but a Thomas Guide to navigate with. Now, a friendly voice can tell us where and when to turn, and if we need an umbrella! I wouldn't go back to the old ways, and I'm amazed I made it across the country, twice, without even a flip phone, let alone an iPhone with all of these amazing travel apps. Then I think of Lewis and Clark and Sacagawea and I'm even more humbled. It's a new world and thanks to the iPhone and travel apps, we can see and enjoy more of it!

reating and monitoring unique passwords for different websites used to be a major hassle. Writing down confidential account information on sticky notes, paper notebooks, or unprotected spreadsheets used to be the norm. However, as the world has become more sophisticated and bad-actor hacking efforts have raised the vigilance bar, using a password manager not only makes security sense, but is practically a requirement. With that in mind, I've broken down the best password managers available for the Apple platform to help find which ones best suit your digital security needs.

BEST FOR APPLE ECOSYSTEM

Apple iCloud Keychain

iCloud Keychain, Apple's native password manager, comes built into all the latest iOS and macOS. It is the default password manager that pops up in Safari, Apple's browser, when you navigate to a login screen. If you elect to use it, it generates and stores your encrypted password to Apple's iCloud service. Doing so automatically

synchronizes your login information to all your iCloud-enabled Apple devices also running Safari.

If you live entirely within the Apple ecosystem and have no need or intent to access your passwords from non-Apple devices, then iCloud is the best choice. It's free, easy to use, and built into all of Apple's operating systems, so there is nothing to download. Like most Apple products, iCloud Keychain masks the complexity normally associated with computer operations such as strong cryptography, multi-step authentication, and secure storage behind a consumer-friendly interface that makes password management effortless... as long as you exclusively use Apple Safari on iOS and macOS for your web-surfing needs.





1Password

(\$3.99/month; \$35.99/year)

This application used to be my primary password manager before Apple and Microsoft chose to bake password protection into their

products. It still is an excellent product, but since they migrated their business model from a flat-license fee to a subscription model, I only use it now for legacy password purposes. I personally am not a fan of most subscriptionbased services, as the costs tend to add up over time, and with something as important as passwords, I would prefer not to have to pay for access to my accumulated security information. Now that companies with much larger, wellfunded teams of security specialists are offering their products for free, I don't find 1Password's subscription option that compelling. They do have some neat features that the mega software companies don't offer (vet), like password monitoring and reporting of compromised credentials, but unfortunately for 1Password, competitors will eventually offer these features as free built-in options as well. If you are a long-time 1Password user willing to fund the company's ongoing efforts, then its product is a worthy investment, but unfortunately, it's no longer worthy enough for me.





Microsoft Authenticator

(Free)

Microsoft has made notable strides in its support for iOS and macOS in the past few years. Nowhere is this more apparent than in its Microsoft Authenticator application, which recently added password management to the application's multi-factor authentication capabilities. Of course, Microsoft gives this app away for free because, just like Apple, Microsoft's password management and synchronization features only work with Microsoft's own Edge web browser. But unlike Apple's solution, these passwords will synchronize across any platform that Edge runs on, including Microsoft Windows, Android, Linux, macOS, and iOS. Configuring Microsoft Authenticator as the default passwordmanagement app and Microsoft Edge as the default web-browsing app on iOS take some effort, but both applications walk you through the process. Once the apps are configured, automatic password generation, protection, and syncing take place automatically. If you need a highly polished, free, multi-platform password manager with builtin multi-factor authentication capabilities and you don't mind using Microsoft Edge as your default browser, then Microsoft Authenticator is an excellent option to consider.



BEST OPEN-SOURCE OPTION

KeePassium Pro

(\$44.99)

At \$45, KeePassium Pro is one of the most expensive password managers available on iOS, but it is a one-time, lifetime-license purchase. Given how frequently developer Andrei Popleteev updates the app, this is a bargain. KeePassium also offers a free version with in-app purchases that allow you to upgrade to a more premium version, but the

Pro version has everything you need when it comes to password management.

KeePassium really just offers front-end access to the free, open-source KeePass project. KeePass is one of the best, most secure open-source password managers available. Free KeePass clients are available for Windows, macOS, Android, Linux, and other operating systems. Several other KeePass clients exist for iOS, but KeePassium Pro is the best one I've seen, even though it is also one of the most expensive. What I like most about KeePassium Pro (and KeePass in general) is its single-file storage of passwords and other secure notes (just like old-school 1Password), its ability to import 1Password files, and the fact that I can control where the single KeePass file lives. If I want the convenience of synchronizing it via iCloud, I can choose to do so. If I want to be extra security-conscious and only share my encrypted KeePass files among selected devices connected to my personal local area network, I can do that too. Given how critically important and sensitive my password data is, I like the fact that I can decide where that data is stored.





OVERALL RECOMMENDATION

As I mentioned earlier, if you are entirely dedicated to living within the Apple ecosystem and have no intent to access your passwords beyond Apple's products, iCloud Keychain is the answer. It's free, easy to use, and all Apple. However, if you are like me and regularly interact with a broad range of operating systems and don't mind using Microsoft Edge as your default browser on iOS and macOS, then a combination of Microsoft Authenticator and KeePass-based products work best. I use Authenticator to store passwords for lowimportance websites like my logins for news sites, scheduling services, and some e-commerce websites. However, for those websites that need ultimate security, such as banks, healthcare, and other highly sensitive areas, I use a selfmanaged KeePass file that I manually copy to only those devices that absolutely need access to that information. It's a bit more overhead, but given how critical those passwords are, I would prefer to keep them fully under my control so as not to worry about any potential leak or vulnerability that could impact cloud-managed password stores. மு

PLAN DATE NIGHT ON YOUR IPHONE

FOOD, ACTIVITIES & TRANSPORTATION FOR A SPECIAL NIGHT OUT

n the past year or two, many of us have gotten out of practice when it comes to going on a real, out-on-the-town date. It's about time you got to celebrate a romantic night out with that special someone, but has it been so long that you've forgotten how to plan a date in the first place? That's the spot I found myself in when I recently started trying to plan a date night for my partner and me. Luckily, I had plenty of tools at my disposal to plan a great night on the town, and you will too, once you know where to look.

DECIDING WHERE TO GO

The first thing you'll want to do is decide where to go. The past year and a half has been rocky for the service industry. Several of my favorite date spots closed during the pandemic. I decided it was time to turn back to the apps for answers.



Cobble

(Free)

If you're in New York City, a fun, novel way to plan a night out is with Cobble. This app

depends on you and your significant other to use the app together, so if you want to plan a surprise outing, skip this option. Otherwise, Cobble's format mimics that of Tinder: you swipe left or right on date ideas, and when both you and your partner swipe right on one, you've got a match.

If you're not in NYC, you can opt for Cobble's "Stay In" date options, but I kept getting suggested NYC restaurants, which was less than helpful, as I live in Austin. I did find some options, like cooking garlic-parmesan wings from Kitchn and watching Space Jam on HBO Max, but my partner and I burned through those pretty quickly without finding any activities we agreed on (probably because most of them would have necessitated a trip to New York).



Skorch

(Free)

Skorch describes itself as a "heat map of cool spots." You can use this app to see which restaurants, bars, and clubs are popular right

now, either in a list from hottest (most popular) to coolest (less frequented) or a map view. This app is only available in a handful of cities, so you'll want to check if yours is on there.

Austin's map seems so barren at the moment, but even with this drawback and the off-putting lingo the app insists on using (places are "Skorch worthy," users gain "clout" by using the app), it's still a fun way to find a place to visit. I like seeing how popular a given restaurant or bar is, both at the moment and more generally.



Yelp

(Free)

You probably know this one. If you want to know what other people think about the places you're considering, Yelp is where you want to

be, if for no other reason than to giggle at the often-ridiculous reasons reviewers give for one-starring a place.



ChefsFeed

(Free)

I'll admit it; I think ChefsFeed is cool. A big bonus for me is that you don't have to create an account when you download the app, and

you still get access to its restaurant maps, experience links, and guides to the best locations in major cities. My favorite feature is its local expert recommendations: scroll to the bottom of the app's main screen to find a list of dishes that local chefs recommend.

ChefsFeed is equally helpful in planning a date night-in. Its Experience tab offers links to livestreams of cooking workshops, recipes, and specialty cocktail tutorials. In one evening, you and your sweetheart might mix a cocktail with a Manhattan bartender, move on to cooking Spanakopita with a Greek chef, and finish up baking dessert with a pastry chef from Calgary. What better way to get a globetrotting culinary experience right from home?

MAKE YOUR PLANS HAPPEN

By now, you should have your plans set: where you're going for drinks, where you're getting dinner, and what other entertainment you'll be taking in on your big night. So, how do you make it all happen? It would be pretty embarrassing to show up to that chef-recommended sushi restaurant, only to find they're full up. To avoid spoiling your plans, use these apps.



OpenTable

(Free)

OpenTable lets you make reservations without having to make a call. Not all restaurants use it, though, and while you can alter your res-

ervation from the app, if you do so, I'd recommend confirming directly with the restaurant because things can get lost in translation from the app to the restaurant occasionally.



Eventbrite

(Free)

Find a plethora of ticketed events, from concerts to plays to haunted houses (am I the only one who thinks this is a great date night

activity?). I always purchase early because my biggest fear is being turned away at the door. Eventbrite tickets will show up straight on your phone, so all you have to do is open the app for the venue's ticket-takers.

TAKING CARE OF THE KIDS

Okay, your night is planned and booked. You're ready to go, but what about the kids? If you have children, you probably don't want to bring them along on your romantic night out, but they can't very well be left in the dog's care, either (unless you're Mary and George Darling and your dog's name is Nana). Don't worry; you can solve this problem from your iPhone, too.



Sittercity: Find Child Care

(Free)

The Sittercity app connects you with local babysitters. You can post jobs for free and wait for babysitters to contact you, and you can set

up interviews after reading the sitters' reviews and checking their qualifications.

GOING OUT & GETTING HOME

You've planned the night, booked your reservations, and the babysitter is on the way. Now, how are you getting there and back? We all know about Uber and Lyft, but let's talk about a couple of lesser-known options for getting you safely to and from your night out.



Transit • Bus & Train Times

(Free, In-app Purchases)

If you live in a city with public transportation, Transit can help you plan your trip, so you won't miss the last bus home or the train that will get

you to your concert on time. You'll be able to see when your bus or train is arriving, as well as a map that shows its progress along its route. If public transportation fails you, you can even order an Uber or Lyft from the app or book a bikeshare.



HotelTonight

(Free)

What happens when you've enjoyed a few too many cocktails or time has gotten away from you? Open up HotelTonight and see what

rooms are available in hotels near you. You might just stumble into a great deal on your last-minute booking.

I hope that these apps will help you as much as they helped me. One last tip from me: use the phone ahead of time; put it away during the date. Our phones can do a lot for us, but they can't replace real human interaction. (1)

Slow Internet, Fast Games



low internet really sucks. My wife and I spent 18 months rebuilding our home on our wooded property in the country. The smart lighting, smart surveillance, smart garage door opener, smart doorbell, smart heating and AC, and smart TV with the usual streaming services all depend on decent internet connection. Unfortunately, in my corner of rural America with one available service provider, I have a perpetual open support ticket. Nothing much changes as I routinely complain of speeds of about 100 kilobytes per second despite the 10 Mbps contract. Slow internet is why I'm not keeping my promise to report on my smart home progress.

Fortunately, it looks like SpaceX headed by Elon Musk will be coming to the rescue. I'm on the waiting list alongside 500,000 others for Musk's Starlink due for the Midwest later this year. For unaware city dwellers, Starlink has launched low-flying satellites for the benefit of rural internet users throughout the world. Current Starlink customers get on average between 50–150Mbps with faster speeds promised to come.

A Simple Smart Home Update

While I wait for StarLink, the one smart device I will report on is the **Kasa HS103P3 Smart Plug** (\$20). I use the Kasa app to schedule and control when a device plugged into the smart plug receives power. For example, the light from our master bathroom's electric toothbrush proved bothersome at night. It took just a few minutes to download the app, sync the plug with my Wi-Fi network, and schedule the toothbrush to turn off at 9 p.m. and back on at 6:30 a.m. (Wi-Fi speed has not been an issue).

What I'm Enjoying in the Meantime

Since I can't share much about my smart home, I'll revert to an old favorite topic. I've been playing games on handheld computers ever since we started writing about them in 1991, beginning with Tetris. My favorites tend to reflect my childhood love for board games, plus some computer gaming classics: Solitaire City, Backgammon, Fieldrunners, Plants vs. Zombies, Conquest (Risk clone), SmartGo Kifu, Finger Arts Sudoku, Wildcard Cribbage, 2048, Chess Pro, Moxie, Niggle, Word Solitaire, and Scrabble.

Currently, **Banana & Co's Spider Solitaire**, a card-based game that is a cross of **Klondike** and **FreeCell**, occupies most of my game-playing time. I move cards from one tableau column to another in sequence, with the idea of removing all the dealt-out cards. I like Spider because it's difficult but not impossible to win, and it has easier modes if I need a quick victory.

I recently discovered that a way to improve my play in almost any game is to search for it on YouTube. Inevitably I will find an expert who models strong game play while providing strategy tips.

My choice of games reflects my boomer age. There is a whole new world of possibilities for the next generation of realistic, visual, multi-dimensional iPhone games thanks to faster processers, better cameras, OLED screens, integrated graphics platforms, augmented reality, and Apple game developer tools. 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
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
