

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

One look at Astro. Amazon's wheeled smart bot, should be enough to convince you that this is, in equal parts, a tremendously stupid and utterly brilliant idea. Stupid because, well, beyond very specific use cases this absolutely isn't something you need or couldn't replace with static hardware that costs a lot less - and that hardware may even be able to cover multiple floors. We suspect Astro's cutesy personality may test the limits of your tolerance over time, and while it can be deactivated at a touch (and Amazon has been careful about encrypting the majority of the robot's data) Astro's wandering brings the uncomfortable reality of the cloud's everlistening ears into sharp focus.

But still, brilliant. Astro uses Amazon's Intelligent Motion tech to help it find its way around your home and around the toys your kids have left all over the floor. It knows what - and who - it's looking at, and has a neat little periscope camera to help it see over surfaces. It's perfect for staying remotely connected to loved ones, particularly those without great mobility, with Amazon's new Alexa Together offering both the ability to set them reminders and get alerts sent back to make sure they're okay. There are some genuinely useful features in Astro - and plenty of frivolous ones, too which begin to justify the oft-repeated prediction about everyone having at least one robot in their home in the future. If Amazon gets Astro right, the future might be closer than we thought.





BUY IT... SOON?

Astro starts as part of Amazon's US-only Day 1 Editions program, which essentially means the company is gauging invite-only interest with a limited run first. So don't expect your own Astro for a while.

ROBOCOP

You can remote control Astro when you're away from home, giving you the opportunity to annoy your cats wherever you may be. Alternatively, set it autonomously patrolling, making the most of Amazon's Ring infrastructure both to spot suspicious events and trundle over to investigate them.

DELIVERY DROID

Not only do Astro's cameras and processors allow it to visually identify the people in your home and deliver reminders and calls directly to them, it also includes a cargo bin to send items around. Never before has a device excited both our spirit of creativity and sheer laziness like this.

AMAZON ECHO SHOW 15

The Echo Show 10's follow-you-around-theroom robo-screen impressed the heck out of us, but somehow the Echo Show 15, a fairly straightforward wall-mountable 1080p 15.6-inch framed display with a 5MP camera, is the device that has us finally convinced that we're living in that sci-fi smart home future. Mountable in portrait or landscape, though more sensibly in landscape given it'll play streaming video, the Echo Show 15 succeeds by centralising everything. Widget-driven note taking, pulling up recipes with floury fingers, watching your security cameras in picture-inpicture, gawping at family photos; this is a core device, and (crucially) one which doesn't demand that you dedicate an inordinate amount of shelf space to a weird-looking speaker.

T3 SAYS: If there's not one of these in your kitchen, is it really a kitchen?







ACER ASPIRE VERO

Waste is a problem, at least until it's an opportunity. Acer appears to identify more with the latter: the Aspire Vero isn't just built for maximum upgrade and repair friendliness, nor is it only a highly recyclable machine in its own right. It's both of those things and more. Its case is paint-free and contains a huge amount of post-consumer recycled plastic, bolstering its environmental cred. Even the recycled (and recyclable) packaging is printed using soy ink and doubles as a handy laptop stand. And Acer hasn't forgotten the guts, packing in a fully Windows-11-friendly 11th-gen Intel package with Iris X graphics, a sharp FHD IPS display, and plenty of ports. A vision of the sustainable future of laptops? We wouldn't be upset if this turned into a trend.

T3 SAYS: A far better nod to environmentalism than just not including a charger.





PURE FREE CITY

Ebikes are maturing and morphing into their own beasts as manufacturers start to get a handle on how we use them. Pure's new sub-£1,000 commuter cycle, also joined on the market by the basket-toting Pure Free Step, doesn't exactly exude cool, but it's certainly high on the practicality charts. The Dutch-style step-through frame, for example, makes the Free City dead easy to mount and promotes an entirely relaxed ride. There's a chain guard, mud guards, a pannier rack, built-in lights and a super-comfortable saddle. Given all those extras this does sit on the heavier end at 28kg, so you'll likely not be taking it far beyond the legally-mandated 25kph top speed, but Pure hasn't skimped on the power plant with a 250W motor and a battery that's good for around 28 miles.

T3 SAYS: Easy commuting for very little cash.

AMAZON HALO VIEW

If the original Halo band wasn't a sign that Amazon is well and truly interested in directing its significant influence towards the fitness market, the Halo View is a twelve-foot billboard rendered in lurid neon. This stick-it-to-Fitbit device brings the company's offering much closer to the competition it's attempting to dethrone. It's certainly cheaper than an Apple Watch, though eerily similar to cheaper devices from the likes of Xiaomi - but Amazon's hardware offering is only the beginning. The company is packing in the extras, too: there's a whole health ecosystem due to grow around it, incorporating (naturally) online classes, mindfulness, recipes and more, with a year's subscription included with the band. This is the start of a fight - or, at least, it will be when Amazon rolls it out globally.

T3 SAYS: A fitter design than the original Halo.



NINJA DUALBREW PRO

Flexibility comes as standard with Ninja's new coffee system. It's adept at working with pods, if that's your aim, apparently beating Keurig's own coffee makers in terms of the speed of K-Cup to cup; it'll work with grounds, brewing up everything from a small cup to a full carafe, or a super-concentrated coffee dribble if you want to get barista-fancy; and there's a fold-away frother and an independent hot water system, meaning you can make tea or soup without a lingering roast ghost tainting the taste. Every important component is easy to disassemble, and you can even reposition its reservoir to suit your space. See? Flexible. And, we have to presume, delicious, given that Ninja has engineered its shower head and threeneedle podwetter to ensure even saturation.

T3 SAYS: Quaff a quality brew of any type.

With HDMI 2.0 on one end, USB 3.0 on the other, and enough muscle in the middle to pull in a 4K signal at 60fps, Razer's new capture dongle is a plug-and-play solution for hooking a camera up to your PC. Exact numbers aren't forthcoming at this point, but it should offer some impressively low latency, making the Ripsaw X an entirely practical way to turn a dusty DSLR (or, indeed, any camera with HDMI output) into a pro-level webcam. Perfect, then, for impressing on Zoom calls or spicing up your game streams. And given that it also supports 120fps at 1080p, we suspect - though Razer isn't pushing it in this direction - that it'll be entirely capable of capturing console gameplay or offloading the strain of streaming from your main PC to a laptop as long as you're not using any HDMI 2.1 specific features.

T3 SAYS: Superior streaming made simple.

SONY WF-C500

ANC grabs all the big true wireless headlines these days, and for good reason. It's awesome, and the high level of competition means it's progressively improving over time. But let's not forget about good old passive noise cancelling: chop out the ANC and you can still get very decent isolation, potentially better battery life, smaller, less clumsy housing, and a definite cost saving over more complex buds. Not that Sony's newest sub-£100 buds skimp on the features. They sport Bluetooth 5.0, IPX4 waterproofing, Android Fast Pair, Sony's DSEE engine and full

custom EQ via the Headphones Connect app. The WF-C500's 5.8mm neodymium drivers can keep rocking for ten hours on a charge, with a complete recharge waiting in the case. And those colours give these some serious accessorising potential.

T3 SAYS: Perfect budget buds - and ace as a second pair for running, too.

HMD Global's Nokia-branded phones have always exemplified the midrange. They pack quality (if not leading) specs, decent (if not Applelevel) cameras, reasonable storage and entirely workable screens, all for an affordable price. But never like this. The G50 slips in under the £200 mark making it, arguably, a phone that is more in the budget bracket than the mid-range. Somehow it hits that price point with Qualcomm's perfectly decent Snapdragon 480 5G platform powering it, making this just about the cheapest 5G phone we've ever seen. Add expandable storage,

18W fast charging and a triplecamera array backed by Al imaging and you've got a fully respectable hardware package. HMD also promises two years' software updates and three years' security patches on top of Android 11, making this a phone that's built to last.

T3 SAYS: Yep, 5G is now mainstream.

We're (mostly) free and (sort of) clear to return to normal life, so we'd say it's high time for some winter road trips to see those people you've missed. But how to avoid the massive, lingering fug that comes along with riding in a car with fast food fed friends, the windows shut, and the heater whacked up to full? The AirBubbl seems like a pretty strong option. Strap it to the back of a headrest and it'll drag 95% of airborne pollutants - including, says Airlabs, coronavirus - through its dual filters, filling your vehicle with 30,000 litres of clear air per hour.

Unsurprisingly, it's already proven popular in public vehicles - and it's perfect if you're driving an Uber though since it's power by USB Type-C, we can see no reason you couldn't bring it inside the house to freshen up those smaller rooms.

T3 SAYS: Even better at clearing the air than a good argument.

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



ROLLING IN THE DEEP

This month, we're celebrating the world's reopening by taking a deep dive into underwater fun

Dubai might be known for its relentless obsession with the world's tallest buildings and the world's highest swimming pools, but one particular record-breaking opening has peaked our interest: Deep Dive Dubai (deepdivedubai.com), which became the world's deepest swimming pool (60 metres, if you were wondering) when it opened in July 2021. And it's truly spectacular: a cylindrical swimming pool that doesn't just contain 14 million litres of water, but a motorbike, sports car, bicycle, chessboard, bench and an entire apartment, complete with bookshelves. And it's not just a gimmick, either - as well as trying dives and freediving taster sessions, visitors can sign up for PADI scuba diving and freediving courses, too.

Speaking of freediving, if you're the kind of person who spent their childhood seeing how long they could hold their breath underwater in the bath, you might want to consider a visit to the Maldives' Amilla Maldives resort (amilla.com) where you can sign up for freediving lessons with

instructors from Apnea Total, one of the world's oldest freediving schools. The resort is on the Baa Atoll, which is the perfect freediving location – it's one of the few places where it's possible to swim with mantas, and divers can also swim the Blue Hole, a 22-metre high chimney populated with stingrays, moray eels and lionfish that opens up to the sea at its base.

Finally, whether you're a snorkeller, freediver or scuba diver, there are a million reasons why Australia's Great Barrier Reef should be on your radar, but we'd like to give a shout out to Lady Elliot Island in particular. There are over 1,500 species of fish here, and certified divers can join Passions of Paradise's fantastic Citizen Science tour (passions.com.au), during which they'll learn all about reef conservation. You'll be accompanied by a Master Reef Guide (and certified PADI Dive Professional), and small group sizes provide a brilliant opportunity to learn about everything from coral planting to reef health.

CONNECT YOUR KITCHEN

Appliances that are smart in at least two senses of the word

Go back a few years and nobody expected kitchen appliances to be smart in any sense of the word. They just hung around dowdily in the background, keeping your milk cold, or washing your socks. Nowadays they have to be goodlooking, intelligent (by fridge standards) and better connected than Boris Johnson's mates. That's what Haier (haier-europe.com) delivers with its new range of smart appliances powered by the curiously-named hOn app.

Haier is the world's number one appliance brand, and this range, under its own name, is arguably closer to the swanky offerings of yet another of its subsidiaries, Fisher & Paykel, but at a more affordable price.

First up is the I-Pro Series 5. This cutting-edge washing machine (from £449) comes in a choice of white or sexy, sexy graphite and promises 'professional washing results at home'. The 'Direct Motion' motor comes with a lifetime guarantee and hygiene fiends will be glad to know that there's also bacteria-slaying built in as standard. The capacity is an impressively meaty 10kg.

The FD 83 series 7 is a hOn-enabled, frost-free fridge freezer (£1,199) with filtered water dispenser that is so smart, it can do everything short of cooking

your dinner. Using the hOn app you can tell the fridge's AI to start cooling before you get back from the shops. It then continues to quick cool after you load the fridge, getting back to the correct temperature no less than '73% faster'.

Another neat little temperature trick is a 'MyZone' drawer that can be set to exactly the right temperature for specific foods, via the hOn app. There are also tweakable humidity zones, fast freezing and defrosting via a 'special pad' and a humungous, 537-litre capacity.

Last but by no means least, there's the self explanatory Haier Wine Bank 50 Series 7 (£699). Available in 42- or 77-bottle versions, this is a great looking mini range of wine fridges that lets you catalogue your vino collection just by scanning the labels on the bottles, into the hOn app.

Of course humidity and temperature are controlled so your wine is in perfect condition when it comes to drinking time, and you can set different conditions for each of the two zones in the fridges. Elegant beech wood shelves minimise vibrations, to keep your wine sediment free, while the glass is UV-resistant, as wine does not enjoy the sunshine. Oh and the door is also lockable, which could be very handy in certain situations.

Guru, what's the secret to perfect steak?

Give it 12 minutes in the microwave at full power, reader, and don't forget to add plenty of ketchup. Please send Chef Guru his Michelin stars to the usual address. Seriously, though, it's not rocket science. You need a good steak, enough heat to form a good sear (but not so much that you'll burn it), and a good pan to cook it in.

For the steak, you have options. If your local butcher hasn't shut down and been resurrected as a confusingly branded vape shop (get your suspicious pink juice at 'Meaty Clouds'), that's a top option; the supermarket will probably do,

but you may also wish to consider a mail-order butcher. GaGu has ordered some quality cuts from thedorsetmeatcompany.co.uk, and there are plenty of other suppliers to choose from.

Heat-wise you're on your own there, but make sure your steak is at room temperature before cooking, and rub in a tiny amount of oil, salt

In terms of that pan, people will crow that cast iron is the best because, well, it is, as long as it's compatible with your hob and your propensity for properly looking after pans. Try ProCook's Cast Iron Griddle (£29), a Le Crueset-esque pan that doesn't break the bank, and should offer your meat a good even heat for an elite eat.

Timing is going to depend on the thickness and your personal preference: start at about two minutes per side, and move on from there. Rest it when you're done.

Can I control my TV with my phone?

Once upon a time, Guru owned the HTC One M8. It was a brilliant phone for the time, back when HTC was not only relevant but essentially leading the Android market, and it had an IR blaster built in. Good times, long gone. That said, you can awkwardly add IR blasters to today's phones: there are USB-C and Lightning dongles out there, priced about

£10, or you could opt for a slightly

smarter blaster like Logitech's

Harmony Hub (£100). Realistically, though, the vast majority of modern TVs don't demand infra-red at all. Tizen, Android TV, Fire TV, Roku TV, whatever: an app on your phone can control at least basic functionality over Wi-Fi, negating the need for anything extra. You might even be able to get more control - a virtual mouse, a keyboard for input, that kind of thing. It really does depend on your TV or smart stick, but it certainly beats hunting under the sofa cushions for the actual remote.

Guru recently liberated a 2019 vintage Amazon Fire TV Cube (£110) from the T3 cupboard during one of his clandestine night raids. Not to watch TV or

OLED laptops

Fitted with a fresh ultra-vibrant panel that's easy both on the eyes and on power, this new breed of laptops is on the rise and forever changing the premium notebook screen

he era of OLED laptops has arrived. Finally, those of us who have long relied on our notebooks for work, gaming and creative endeavours can now reap the many benefits of this new screen panel technology – eye–popping visuals, better efficiency, thinner form – in the compact convenience of portable PCs.

So what exactly is an OLED laptop? Simply, an OLED laptop is a notebook fitted with a display that uses an OLED panel. Folks who aren't too anxious to keep up with the latest and greatest might not care, but those who spend a great part of their day staring at a computer screen should.

Short for 'Organic Light Emitting Diode', OLED is a type of panel that uses organic molecules, which enable its individual pixels to emit their own light every time an electric current is applied, forgoing the need for an external light source that an LCD panel typically uses. No external light source, no massive backlighting, no light leakage. This

allows the pixels to produce deeper blacks, as well as better contrast and higher colour accuracy.

OLED technology itself isn't exactly new. It's been our gracing TV sets, mobile phones and even mobile gaming consoles with its extra brilliant presence for years now. It's just taken a while to reach laptops. Part of the reason why is Samsung's monopoly on the OLED market. By the end of 2018, the South Korean conglomerate had acquired more than 95% share of the small- to mid-sized OLED panel market globally. This meant that the decision to make OLED screens specifically designed for notebooks was left largely up to the company. It wasn't until January 2019 when it announced the successful development of the world's first 15.6-inch OLED display for laptops.

Not that it was going to be a whole lot easier if Samsung hadn't been pulling the strings. The panels themselves are notoriously hard – and, therefore, expensive – to make, with a large number of them breaking in production. So, when

these laptop-specific OLED panels eventually made it to mass production for such manufacturers as Lenovo, Dell and HP, they were first made specifically for ultra-HD or 4K screens on premium laptop models. Saving them for the highest configurations was perhaps the only way to really justify their staggering price to consumers.

Much like with any pricey new tech, however, that high price tag should go down to a more affordable level eventually. It's already starting to, in fact. With the new Vivobook Pro 14 OLED and Vivobook Pro 15 OLED notebooks, which rolled out in early September touting 2.8K resolution displays, Asus has made that tech much more accessible.

THE FUTURE OF COMPUTING

OLED displays are the next great thing in portable computing and their improvements over earlier panel technologies are undeniable. These laptop screens promise not only deep blacks and rich, stunning colours, but also incredible picture quality and faster response times.

This is just the kind of stunning visuals gamers crave when they're traversing an open-world title or a narrative-driven game. Meanwhile, remote workers and digital nomads will benefit from the fact that they offer better visibility when viewed in full sunlight.

That's not to mention that OLED panels tend to be more energy efficient, which should bring about advancements in design and power consumption. OLED laptops boast slightly better battery life, and much like OLED TVs have a thinner form factor, making them more ideal travel companions.

These panels also typically emit much less blue light than their LCD counterparts around half the amount. Those who spend long hours on their laptops will appreciate that an OLED display is not only kinder to the eyes, but also less likely to suppress melatonin secretion and keep them awake.

While one could argue that OLED laptops from different manufacturers come with varying colour coverage ratings, despite using the same Samsung panel, creatorspecific offerings like the Asus Studiobook 16 OLED and its Pro version touting 100% DCI-P3 colour gamut and Pantone and Calman certifications ensure that designers, photographers, filmmakers and video streamers can get into this next-generation of notebooks without worry.

As with any tech in its early stages, it still comes with a few caveats worth knowing about. Notwithstanding the affordable 2.8K offerings from Asus, laptop-specific OLED panels remain largely available on 4K configurations, which means they are still mostly out of reach for the budget-minded. Of course, you can always get the Vivobook Pro 14 OLED – or, at least, when it becomes readily available as the ongoing components shortage is currently affecting the stock. But if you're partial to a brand or a laptop line, your options at the moment are limited. Even Dell's XPS 13 3.5K OLED configuration will set you back a little over £1,500.

Concerns about burn-in have also often been raised. OLED panels are more susceptible than LCD to burn-in, where part of an image remains on the screen as a ghostly background long after the screen has changed the picture or image on display. However, the issue isn't as bad as people make it out to be. Burn-in only happens when an image remains on the screen for many hours, which causes certain pixels to degrade faster. Since most people utilise their laptops for a variety of things, viewing different content, a laptop screen is often changing images, which means that the threat of burn-in is low.

Finally, gamers might take issue with the refresh rate. Samsung's first round of OLED panels for laptops are limited to a 60Hz refresh rate. Gamers who require 120Hz, 144Hz or 240Hz displays for twitch gameplay, therefore, might find these laptops wanting. OLED laptops in their current iteration aren't going to be ideal for esports, first-person shooters and battle arena titles.

The good news is that the company has already started mass producing its 90Hz panels, with the Vivobook Pro 14 OLED being among the first to use them. These

Despite the fact that Samsung has a monopoly on OLED panels for laptops, not all OLED laptops are created equal. There's a handful out there that have proven themselves to be absolute standouts. Some of them, like the HP Spectre, are unsurprising given their line's merits; others, like the Asus Vivobook, are underdogs we didn't quite see coming. Every single one, however, has proven itself worthy of blazing the trail for future OLED laptops.

If you're looking to be an early adopter, whether you want a laptop for gaming or for creating content, whether you have a smaller budget or have deep pockets, start with one of these top-notch choices.




RAZER BLADE 15 OLED 4K 60HZ

If you want sumptuous colours and contrast for graphics and gaming but don't want to drop the price you'd pay for an 8K TV, the Blade 15 is a great compromise. That screen offers full 4K and while its 60Hz refresh rate might not offer




ASUS VIVOBOOK PRO 14X OLED

newer generation OLED laptops should attract the attention of gamers. They're also a sign that it won't be long until panels with much higher refresh rates become available.

PRAGMATIC PROSPECT

The decision of whether to become an early adopter or to wait, therefore, hangs on what you'll be using an OLED laptop for. Luckily, OLED laptops are no longer limited to 15.6-inch screens, 4K resolution or high-end configurations. As a result, the range of options for laptop users has certainly widened, if only a little. Perhaps the biggest factor to consider before buying one is the

refresh rate. Competitive and fast-paced gamers would want an OLED display with a faster refresh rate, so an OLED laptop with a 90Hz display might be the way to go. These are expected to rival 120Hz LCD panels.

Meanwhile, gamers who are less concerned about refresh rates and care more about higher resolutions would probably want to future-proof their rig with a 4K option. As would content creators who need the sharpest picture quality and more screen real estate to work with.

Speaking of screen real estate, since OLED panels are no longer limited to 15.6-inch displays, there are more screen sizes to

choose from. Dell's popular XPS line already offers a 13.4-inch option while Asus has 14-inch and 16-inch aces in its Zenbook, Vivobook and ProArt lines. As does HP.

Gaming laptops aren't far behind. The likes of Alienware, Razer and Gigabyte have already rolled out their 15-inch OLED portable gaming powerhouses. The only thing is that you might have to wait a little while to find a 17-inch option.

If you do expect to do a lot of gaming or video editing on your 4K OLED laptop, remember that you'll require a robust graphics card. Otherwise, it's never going to reach the high frame rates and sharpest resolution required for an impeccably

The range of options for laptop users has certainly widened, if only a little

smooth experience. Be sure you're getting one rocking an Nvidia GeForce RTX 3070 or higher inside. If you're not, you might be better off saving your money. A non-4K OLED laptop, albeit less common, will still deliver all the benefits an OLED display affords without costing as much.

Whichever option you go for, however, OLED laptops are truly worth the hype, and you won't regret being an early adopter.

GET THE BEST OUT OF YOUR OLED LAPTOP

OLED laptops aren't exactly cheap. Here's how to milk yours for what it's worth

JOIN THE DARK SIDE

The beauty of OLED displays is that when they're displaying black, they're essentially displaying nothing. While doing so, they're not consuming any energy, which can result in improved battery life. This means Dark Mode on Windows could be the butter to an OLED laptop's bread. Samsung itself has said that OLED laptops can save up to 25% more display energy when used in dark mode.

SLOW BURN

Although experts have said that OLED laptops are less likely to suffer burn-in, there are also things you can do yourself to further minimise its likelihood. Switching up content every now and then is the one obvious way to do so, making sure that your screen isn't displaying the same thing for too long. As is

utilising a screen saver. Less obvious ways include auto-hiding the Windows taskbar so that it doesn't just sit there at the bottom of the screen the whole time you're using it, limiting your use of subtitles when watching movies or shows, and removing desktop icons - essentially avoiding static images in general.

CONSUME, CONSUME, CONSUME

What use is a stunner of a display if you're not going to use it to its full potential? Especially if you have a non-gaming OLED laptop, you absolutely still need to take advantage of the gorgeous visuals it has to offer. So, consume as much content as you can with it. We don't just mean YouTube videos. Give your TV a break, and enjoy a more intimate viewing experience on that laptop. Everything – from your favourite

superhero movies to every episode of Bob's Burgers and Adventure Time – is going to look fantastic on it.

STEP INTO THE LIGHT

While sunlight is an OLED TV's kryptonite, OLED laptops will thrive in full sun. Much like its OLED displays for smartphones, Samsung's OLED laptop panels are sunlightfriendly, which means they aren't susceptible to the damage their TV counterparts are in direct sunlight. What's more, these displays typically tout 400 or more nits of brightness, and your OLED laptop's entire screen is going to be visible regardless of whether you're indoors or at a park. So, especially if you're now working from home, do yourself a favour and breathe in some fresh air for a couple of hours whilst being productive.

NO TIME TO DIE


Marking the release of James Bond's latest film, pre-owned watch specialist
Watchfinder & Co. takes a look back at some of 007's most iconic watches





SEAN CONNERY

The first reference to a specific Bond watch was made in Ian Fleming's second book, Live and Let Die, in 1954. It was a Rolex. Fleming himself also wore one, more specifically an Explorer I. So it was no surprise when Sean Connery sported a Rolex in the very first Bond film Dr No, an early Submariner 6538, also known as the 'Big Crown' due to its very prominent winding crown. First produced by the company in 1955, and only manufactured for four years, this watch has become known as the James Bond Submariner. The highly collectable 6538 was also worn by Connery in From Russia with Love and Goldfinger. Good condition examples of this limited edition watch have sold for over £400,000 at auction.







GEORGE LAZENBY

Following on from the Connery era, Lazenby took over the role of Bond (albeit briefly) in On Her Majesty's Secret Service in 1969. And with the new Bond, came a new watch... This time, instead of the Submariner, Bond opted for a 6238 Rolex Chronograph. The piece, favoured in motorsport, is often described as a kind of 'pre Daytona', as it has all the features of the enigmatic reference except the tachymeter bezel (a measure often used by drivers to calculate speed and units per hour). Bond's 6238 is the only one of its kind – it was redesigned at the request of the producers to incorporate a red second hand that acted as Bond's built-in compass.



ROGER MOORE

It wasn't until the early '70s that the Q Branch really started going to town on Bond's watches. In the 1973 film Live and Let Die Moore wears a significantly modified Rolex Submariner 5513 that contains a high-powered magnet and its very own circular saw, where the rotating bezel doubles up as the blade. It wasn't all Swiss watches for Roger Moore's Bond, though; he was also seen sporting a Hamilton Pulsar in the opening scenes of *Live* and Let Die, a Seiko 0674 LC (which also functioned as a message printing pager) in The Spy Who Loved Me and a Seiko M534 Memory Bank throughout Moonraker, which Q equips with explosives and a remote detonator.







TIMOTHY DALTON

Timothy Dalton took over the role of 007 in 1987 serving up a darker, grittier Bond - truer to the original character portrayed in Fleming's novels. In The Living Daylights Dalton is seen wearing TAG Heuer Professional Night-Dive 980.031. The watch enjoyed approximately 10 seconds of screen time and it was the first, and last, time that Bond was seen wearing a TAG. In Dalton's second 007 film, Licence to Kill, we see Bond return to the Rolex Maison, wearing the newly introduced 16610. Produced until 2010, the 16610 was made from 904L surgical grade stainless steel (more resistant to corrosion and saltwater damage) and, for the first time, utilised white gold for the hands and markers meaning it wouldn't rust or patina over time.

PIERCE BROSNAN

Goldeneye marked the first Bond film to feature an Omega on 007's wrist - specifically an Omega Seamaster 300M Quartz Professional 2541.80.00 with a full size stainless steel case, blue face, blue bezel and stainless steel bracelet. Costume designer Lindy Hemming, responsible for selecting 007's watch for the film, said she felt that Commander Bond, "a naval man, a diver and a discreet gentleman of the world", would only wear the Seamaster with a blue dial. Brosnan goes on to wear a Seamaster Professional 2531.80 Chronometer in Tomorrow Never Dies, The World is Not Enough and Die Another Day.







DANIEL CRAIG

Daniel Craig took up the mantle of Bond in 2006 in Casino Royale and sports a Seamaster Diver 300M and a Planet Ocean 600M. In Quantum of Solace, 007 wears another Seamaster Planet Ocean 600M this time with a smaller case and a steel bracelet. In Skyfall Bond wears yet another Planet Ocean 600M, this time in titanium, and a somewhat dressier Aqua Terra. Craig's fourth outing as Bond in the 2015 Spectre features an Omega Seamaster Aqua Terra 150M Master and the Omega Seamaster 300 Spectre Limited Edition. Notably, the Seamaster 300 finally marked Craig's first tricked-out watch as Bond!

WATCH OUT.... In No Time to Die fans will spot three Omega watches. Bond sports the lightweight Seamaster Diver 300M 007 Edition, new agent Nomi (Lashana Lynch) wears a 38mm Seamaster Aqua Terra with a black dial and black NATO strap and Moneypenny (played by Naomie Harris) is equipped with a 27.4mm De Ville Prestige on a hunter green leather strap.



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

iPhone 13 Pro

Apple's iPhone 13 Pro is better than ever, thanks to an incredible screen and battery life

ith the upgraded triplelens camera system, the 120Hz ProMotion screen and the most powerful phone processor ever, the iPhone 13 Pro has blown past our expectations. It's a great phone, ticking off almost all the things people wanted from the Pro this year, and improving all of the basics along the way.

There's no big design change for the iPhone 13 range, so the 13 Pro looks very similar to the previous model. There are giveaways though. On the front, the camera notch is not as wide – a reduction of 20%. It is still the same height though, so it doesn't actually give you more screen space. It just means a bit more room for battery, Wi-Fi, data and network icons.

That screen is still protected by the ceramic shield, which is designed to be more durable and protect against drops and knocks. The phone has an IP68 water resistance, which means that it is rated for submersion at depths over one metre for 30 minutes. As on the previous models, the sidebands are surgical grade stainless

steel, and have been colour-matched to this year's four colour options. In addition to the Graphite, gold and silver versions, there is a new Sierra blue model, replacing last year's darker Pacific blue. This year's gold also feels a little lighter, giving it a more subtle and classy feel.

On the rear, the camera positioning remains the same but the raised section and lenses are more pronounced. The difference is millimetres, but when the phones are put back to back, you can see the difference. Thankfully the cases for the Pro allow for this and once on, you'd never know it was any different.

Of course, if you do opt for one of the leather or silicone Apple cases for the iPhone 13 Pro, you won't see much of the body colour, aside from the small area underneath the clear camera array. But with a phone of this expense, we would definitely recommend keeping it in a sturdy case for extra protection.

The display on the iPhone 13 Pro is 6.1 inches, and has a resolution of 2532x1170, which works out as a

razor-sharp 460 pixels per inch. It's not quite as expansive as the Pro Max's 6.7 inches but also narrowly beats its 458ppi resolution.

Like last year's model, it supports Dolby Vision HDR. And while previous Pro models maxed at 800 nits of brightness for regular use, it can now hit 1,000 nits in bright light, which is excellent. It only falls short in comparison to the screen of the Pro Max, which tops out at 1,200 nits: even the majority of high-end TVs don't deliver that much brightness.

Refreshing change

The headline feature on the screen, of course, is support for refresh rates up to 120Hz – all previous iPhones were 60Hz. Refreshing the screen twice as often means anything moving on it looks smoother and clearer - so that can be animations, but also when you're scrolling through lists or webpages, you can actually see what's going past, instead of it being a blur.

This tech can hammer battery life, but Apple uses it smartly, thanks to tech it calls ProMotion. Basically, the

With its greater refresh rate, basic browsing looks much smoother

iPhone dynamically shifts how often it refreshes the screen depending on what's happening. Scrolling? It'll ramp up to 120Hz. Watching a video? It'll drop to 60Hz or 30Hz to match the video.

We'd never felt that the iPhone's screen needed a greater refresh rate, until we tried the 13 Pro. Now going back to the 12 Pro feels really juddery in comparison. Basic browsing through photos and websites instantly looks smoother and gives the whole OS a more premium feel.

The real benefit comes in gaming. We tried out the Catalyst Black game, which is due out this December and makes use of the 120Hz fresh rate. Playing it on 13 Pro compared to the 60Hz iPhone 13, you can notice the difference in movement.

Unlike last year, where the iPhone 12 Pro Max had the best camera on any of the iPhone models, this time the 13 Pro and Pro Max share the joint best camera. So you've got a triplecam setup on the rear, with a 12MP f/1.8 ultra-wide (120-degree) camera, a 12MP f/1.5 wide-angle camera, and



a 12MP f/2.8 3x telephoto lens. This means you've got a total zoom range of 6x, because the wide-angle is 0.5x to the wide-angle, and the telephoto is 3x. The wide and ultra-wide both have larger apertures to let in more light, and while the telephoto has a smaller aperture, that's because it's a longer zoom than Apple's used before.

The sensors on all of them capture more light and they promise a major boost in low-light performance – Apple says they can capture fully 50% more light. In fact, Night mode is now available on all three lenses for the first time. Unlike non-Pro iPhones,

you have also have a LiDAR sensor in the camera setup, which is used to help to autofocus in low light, so you can actually get focused and shot before the moment passes.

And the lenses have a final trick up their sleeves: the ultra-wide lens can be used for macro photography with a focal distance of 2cm, which is a first for iPhones.

On top of all this, Apple has stepped up its image processing game again, with a new chip in the A15 processor that focuses on noise reduction and tone mapping, and provides the next generation of Apple's great Smart HDR processing for high-contrast scenes.

Part of that is the addition of a new 'Photographic Styles' feature, which effectively lets you choose a slightly different processing preset when you shoot. It's not like applying a filter to an already taken picture – the iPhone is adjusting how it handles things like colour and contrast during shooting, so that you can choose a preset with more colour saturation, say, but it won't make skin tones look fake.

And, of course, the Pro iPhones include Apple's ProRaw shooting option, so you can shoot in a format

that gives the editing flexibility of raw photos, but without losing the Apple core image processing on noise reduction and tone handling that small sensors like these really need.

The important thing about the iPhone 13 Pro camera array is that it gives the photographer the choice of how to capture an image. Using the ultra-wide, wide and telephoto lenses leads to very different results, but each one looks great in its own right.

When it comes to video, there are two huge new additions. First is the fact that you can also record video in Macro mode, which is a very cool option to have. The really big one is Cinematic Mode, though. The simple way to explain this is that it's like Portrait Mode for video, in that you can choose something to be in focus, and a fake depth-of-field blur is applied to the rest.

But that's only scratching the surface: it also uses AI smarts to track what's happening while you record, and will smoothly shift the focus automatically. So, for example, if someone turns away from the camera to look at someone else, it will shift the focus from the first person to the second. And after the video is recorded, you can still choose what

should be in focus, and manually shift the focus throughout the scene.

The nutty processor

The iPhone 13 Pro uses Apple's new A15 Bionic processor, which is the most powerful chip in any phone to date. And while the iPhone 13 and iPad mini (6th Gen) also use the A15, it is specifically the version in the Pro and Pro Max that's the most powerful. Here, you get more RAM and a five-core GPU, which is great for keeping things totally smooth on the ProMotion screen.

General operation here is seamless and fast, even when using iMovie and Garage Band, which are memory intensive. Using Geekbench, the iPhone 13 Pro delivered a multi-core score that was 12% higher than that of the iPhone 12 Pro Max.

Battery life offers a decent 15%-20% increase over the iPhone 13. Of course, battery is one area where the Pro Max stands out. Apple says you should get 20-25% more life from the Pro Max than you do here. We found it was only after 48 hours of fairly heavy use that the phone dipped below 20%. If longevity is your major priority, then the Pro Max is definitively the model you should go for.

The iPhone 13 Pro delivers in every area, from the excellent camera array to the 120Hz screen and the long-life battery.

If you're happy with a slightly smaller screen and a couple of hours less battery life, you should definitely consider the iPhone 13 Pro over the Max. This year, there is less difference between the two models, so the battery and screen sizes are the only differences. If having the very best in every other area is important, then this is the phone for you.

Apple iPhone 13

With a great set of features and a competitive price, the iPhone 13 is the model most users should choose

he iPhone 13 is a worthy step forward, delivering smart and genuinely useful upgrades where they're most wanted. Apple hasn't tried to throw in some whizzy new feature or design just for the sake of it – it's focused on making sure the iPhone delights you where it can, and doesn't disappoint where it shouldn't.

Despite not having the stainless-steel bands of the Pro models and having a glossy rather than matte glass back, the iPhone 13 still feels like a premium device. The plus side of not having the steel bands of the Pro model and using aluminium instead is that it's lighter than the Pro – it weighs 173g, while the iPhone 13 Pro weighs 203g, and you'd be amazed how much you notice that 30g difference. It's just easier to hold and shift around in your hand than the Pro version.

The iPhone 13's screen is very similar to the iPhone 12's, in that it's a 6.1-inch OLED display with a resolution of 1170x2532. That makes it a razor-sharp 460 pixels per inch – and the equal of the 13 Pro. It still supports features such as the P3 wide colour gamut and True Tone, and there's Dolby Vision HDR.

Sure, the lack of ProMotion technology here means the refresh rate is limited to 60Hz, and you can see a difference compared to phones like the 13 Pro that have high-refresh rates, but unless you're planning on lots of gaming, you probably won't miss it in any real ways.

The combination of wide and ultra-wide lenses on the iPhone 13 cover most bases, with the ultra-wide providing some really dynamic landscapes and portraits. However, those looking for more classic portraits will miss having a longer lens, like on the 13 Pro. Fortunately, most of the 13 Pro's other camera features make a showing here, including Cinematic mode, improved night mode and Photographic Styles.



The iPhone 13 is powered by Apple's newest phone processor: the A15, although it's not the Bionic version you'll find in the Pro. There's no huge leap forward in how fast it feels compared to the A14 in the iPhone 12, but that doesn't matter at all, since there was no lack of speed already. Even with larger apps such as Garage Band and iMovie, there's no sign of any delays.

The biggest performance change is the improved battery life, helped partly by the A15's efficiency, and partly by a bigger battery unit. Apple rates this iPhone as being able to last for 15 hours of streamed video. After a full day of testing with the phone and a night on standby, the phone still had around 40% battery left, although this wasn't as good as with the Pro, which can easily make it through 48 hours.

The iPhone 13 is a solid reliable smartphone with some clever photo and video features that comes in at a price point that is competitive. For those that want the very best, the iPhone 13 Pro range has that under control. For everyone else, the iPhone 13 is the phone to buy.

MINI-BEAST

Apple iPad mini

Sleeker design, smarter features and powerful flexibility make this a tablet to treasure

he new iPad mini is a pocket rocket of a computer. It's got the power of a laptop but is smaller than an A5 notebook. It's got a bigger screen, better stylus support, much faster processor, improved cameras, more advanced connectivity and it's incredibly light.

The power-packed tablet is more capable than ever but you will have to pay a little extra for the pleasure. The 64GB model is £479 while the top of the range 256GB adds £140 to the price. And if you want 5G it's an extra £150. But you are getting something special.

The most obvious update is the design, which switches to a new look with slimmer bezels and rounded corners. The edges of the iPad are now flat, which means a smaller body, but bigger screen, being boosted from 7.9 to 8.3 inches.

There's a slight change in aspect ratio from the previous model – it was 4:3, but it's now more like 3:2. This makes it more widescreen in landscape mode. The resolution of 2266x1488 is nice and high, and it gives a pixel density of 326 ppi – so everything looks sharp and detailed.

The flat sides also mean the mini can now support the Apple Pencil 2, which clips to the its sides and charges wirelessly. It was accurate and responsive in our tests, but the 60Hz refresh rate means that there is a very slight lag from when you draw to when it appears on-screen.

The new Apple A15 processor gives a huge boost in power. It makes the iPad mini as fast as you could possibly want it to be. You can run apps side by side, edit 4K videos, tweak photos, play games and switch quickly from task to task. It has also added the option for 5G connectivity.

There's a new rear camera with a major upgrade – better sensor, wider aperture, smarter processing. And it takes lovely shots, records 4K video at up to 60 fps, and includes Apple's



fantastic image stabilisation. The front camera has had an equally huge upgrade. It now has an ultra-wide-angle lens, 1080p video recording and supports Centre Stage - Apple's clever tech that means the camera will centre the picture on you during video calls.

Battery life offers around 10 hours but drains quicker than other iPad models. Elsewhere the Home button is gone and Touch ID fingerprint unlocking has been moved to the Sleep/Wake button, on the side of the device. The Lightning port has been replaced with a USB-C port, which adds a lot more flexibility for accessories.

Ultimately, the iPad mini is very fast, with a great-looking screen, and some excellent usability and flexibility improvements. Its flaws are mostly things that you just have to accept as inevitable if you want a pint-sized tablet – the screen will feel overly small in some cases, and the battery isn't as strong as bigger iPads. But these are the trade-offs you make for a digital wonder that weighs under 300g, and, in our opinion, they're fair enough.

o you want a TV that you'll ache to watch each and every day at a price that blows the competition out of the water? Then say hello to the Philips OLED+936.


So what do you get? An OLED TV with a soundbar-like speaker system attached that has had a top notch upgrade from its predecessor – the +935 – making it a seriously impressive all-in-one home cinema upgrade.

Behind the glass of the OLED+936 you will find a dual-chip image processor, which allows for even smarter image adjustments than before, including the craftiest anti-screen burn measures we've seen to date (good news for gamers), while below the glass there's a revamped audio system courtesy of Bowers & Wilkins, which delivers higherfidelity Dolby Atmos audio (good news for movie fans).

Straight out of the box, you get a TV that looks distinctly upmarket. The panel is held in a premium steel frame, and is predictably wafer thin. It bulges out for electronics, connectivity and Ambilight LEDs, but not by much. The Bowers & Wilkins sound system is integrated into the short pedestal stand, connected to the panel via a captive cable.

But it's not just its good looks that make it a winner. There's a lot more to





like about the +936. In the 55-inch and 65-inch screens, the panel is the latest 'OLED evo' design from LG Display (which makes the displays in all OLED TVs) and is capable of higher brightness and greater colour vibrancy. It's worth noting though that this higherbrightness panel is not used in the 48-inch version of the OLED+936.

Powering the panel is the fifth iteration of the brand's P5 processor, here in AI Intelligent Dual Picture Engine guise, enabling a raft of enhancements. Perhaps the most significant, certainly when it comes to day-to-day viewing, is Ambient Intelligence. This is the ability to measure and react to available room light using the TV's sensor, adjusting the image accordingly to maintain the best contrast and brightness.

But how good is the picture? It's extraordinarily good at giving non HDR content a comparable dynamic lift, and closing the subjective gap between regular HD and native 4K.

Its newly improved Perfect Natural Reality circuitry has enhanced highlight detection and finds up to 30% more sharpness thanks to AI processing. AI Smart Bit Enhancement

2.0 effectively eliminates colour banding, making sunsets and animated gradations silky smooth, almost looking like real life. Occasionally, you suspect the screen is over-emphasising grain, but when you look again, it appears perfect. Elsewhere, a new Home Cinema setting proves to be rather excellent. It boasts cool whites, high contrast and a vibrant colour palette. It goes some way to replicating the kind of visual pop you'll see at a premium laser cinema.

HDR format support is wide. In addition to Dolby Vision, there's HDR10+ Adaptive, HLG, regular HDR10 and game specific HGiG HDR - something Sony and LG don't offer. Peak HDR brightness is high: one of the top performers in its class.

Finally, for gamers the latency is good but not remarkable: around 21ms in Game mode.

Sonically sound

Keeping up the wow factor is the slightly revised Bowers & Wilkins sound enclosure. B&W's characteristic 'Tweeter on Top' remains a crowning glory, offering supreme dialogue articulation.

However, small changes have led to an altogether bigger sound stage. There's a more pronounced sense of travel as objects are panned across the front soundstage, and a more immersive height component too. This doesn't just manifest itself on action movies, but is evident on subtle atmospherics.

Total power output is rated at a brawny 70W. This is usable muscle too, as the set doesn't easily distort. If you want more power, there is a subwoofer output connection. HDMI eARC to external speakers is also supported.

The OLED+936 is a groundbreaking OLED TV that combines innovative features, elite picture performance and thrilling Atmos audio. Simply put, it's a corker.

SWITCHING GEARS

Nintendo Switch OLED

The Big N's games console just got bigger and better, making it this year's must-have gaming gadget

f you're a first-time Switch buyer then the Nintendo Switch OLED is a nobrainer: it has had a shakeup when it comes to the display and there have been a few small design tweaks. But if you are considering upgrading your original Nintendo Switch then it's not really worth it as they are very similar.

The seven-inch OLED display is a beauty, even though the resolution is

still just 720p. Games like *Breath of the Wild* really showcase the potential of the new OLED screen – it's bright, colourful and the contrast has improved massively. Even on the simple Home screen, lettering comes across with clarity and colours are vibrant, popping out of the display.

Where you really make the most of the new seven-inch OLED panel is in tabletop mode where two players both use the display at the same time, thanks to the increased screen real estate combined with the improved viewing angles. But if you play in handheld mode a lot, it's still definitely worth spending the extra cash because the OLED model has improved brightness and contrast.

Also worth a mention is Automatic Brightness. Using sensors on the console, the brightness on the display is adjusted depending on where and when you are playing – that's perfect





for those who lose themselves in a game and don't notice that they're squinting as the room gets darker.

The whole device looks sleek and modern, partly aided by the very slim bezels. The build quality feels solid and premium for the most part. On the back, the kickstand now stretches across the whole length of the screen, which makes it much more stable to use propped up on a table, with the controllers attached or without.

The OLED model measures 102x242x13.9mm with the Joy-Cons attached, which is just a little taller than the original. It weighs just over 20g more now as well, so 420g in total. Despite a slight increase in size, it's still comfortable to use in handheld mode, although now less pocket-friendly. There's also a wired LAN port on the dock to connect it directly to your Wi-Fi router using an ethernet cable - this means you'll be able access the fastest internet speeds your home network allows for.

Elsewhere on the outside of the dock, there are two additional USB ports that can be used for a number of different things, like charging your Nintendo Switch Pro controller or

even the Joy-Cons when they're attached to the grip.

Refresh your memory

As what's under the hood is identical across the old and the new versions of the Nintendo Switch, there isn't much to say there. Powered by the Nvidia customised Tegra processor, the Nintendo Switch OLED is fast, responsive and a pleasure to play.

There's 64GB of internal memory here, which is loads, but if you do run out, you can expand it using a MicroSD card, which slides into the back panel, beneath the kickstand.

In handheld and tabletop mode, you'll be able to make use of the new enhanced stereo speakers, which are very loud and clear considering the size of the console, although the sound does come out a little tinny when the volume is up all the way.

The Nintendo Switch OLED has a battery life of 4.5 to 9 hours, the same as the original and plenty for most people. It would have been nice to see an improvement in the battery life but it is still quite impressive that they've managed to keep it the same despite having a more demanding display.

The Nintendo Switch OLED has come on leaps and bounds when it comes to how it feels to play on the go, as opposed to when it's hooked up to your TV (that side of things is just as pleasurable as it has always been). We were blown away by how vibrant the graphics look - it makes the whole experience incredibly enjoyable.

The only reason we would tell you not to buy this console is if you already own the Nintendo Switch. Under the hood, they're almost exactly the same so it's not really worth splashing the cash. But if you are looking to buy the Nintendo Switch for the first time then this model is the one you should get. It's without a shadow of a doubt Nintendo's best games console yet.

FLIP THE SCRIPT

Samsung Galaxy Z Flip 3

The best folding phone for most people, this is a stylish flip phone that is actually worth buying

ost smartphones look more or less identical. They are often samey slabs of glass that don't really have much to set them apart physically. The Samsung Galaxy Z Flip 3 is definitely not one of those. It looks completely different and it's a really good-looking phone.

Naturally, when you fold it up it does feel quite thick. Measuring 72.2 x 86.4 x 17.1 – 15.9mm, it does add some bulk to your pocket but it'll still be small enough to fit into it in the first place. At 183g, the Samsung Galaxy Z Flip 3 5G weighs the same as a regular smartphone, which makes it just as comfortable to use and hold.

One of the biggest changes is the build quality. Like the Samsung Galaxy Z Fold 3, this is one of Samsung's toughest phones yet. It's made from a durable Armor Aluminium, Corning Gorilla Glass Victus and it has the highest IPX8 rating, which means it'll survive being dunked in water.

On the original Galaxy Z Flip, the cover screen was only 1.1 inches, which was just too small. It meant you couldn't do much on it and it could only display one notification at a time. Now, it has a screen that is quadruple

the size, so it can fit up to four notifications on it at once, which are fully customisable.

The large 6.7-inch Full HD+ Dynamic AMOLED 2X display inside has an adaptive refresh rate of 120Hz, which makes it feel buttery smooth to scroll and swipe on. Mobile games feel slick and browsing the web feels effortless. As you would expect from Samsung, the screen looks seriously crisp with bright colours.

The crease on the screen doesn't dramatically change the experience of using the main display. However, when the screen is white, tilted or light is reflecting off it, it becomes very obvious and can sometimes warp images a little. One other problem is the screen isn't always completely responsive near the crease and sometimes missed our tap.

When the phone is partially folded, the Flex Panel shifts your app content to the top half and places settings like the volume on the bottom half. You can also split the screen and have multiple windows open at once, like if you wanted to continue watching a video while you do a bit of online shopping.

The phone is powered by the most recent Qualcomm Snapdragon 888 CPU, which means it should be faster than the original Z Flip's 7nm chip. In use, larger apps like games seemed to load very quickly and we didn't notice any lag in mobile games.

The Flip 3 has a 3,300mAh battery inside; that's a lot smaller than most smartphones. However, running a video for over two hours on full brightness, its battery level dropped by 14%, which suggests it would have lasted over 14 hours in total.

Picture imperfect

Full disclosure, the camera tech isn't the most impressive you'll see on a smartphone at this price. Some of our point-and-shoot photos using the rear cameras came out looking great, while others, even on the sunniest day, came out lacking sharpness and detail. Similarly, colours looked vibrant and accurate for the most part, but without the right lighting, they could look dull at times.

While the camera system is unlikely to blow you away, there are a few really useful features. Firstly, Flex Panel works here as well. With the

screen partially folded you can have the preview placed on the top panel with the camera settings on the bottom or vice versa.

The other cool camera feature to highlight is that you can actually take shots without unfolding the phone at all, you just double press the power key. Although the screen will be too small to see much on, it'll still be great for snapping quick selfies on the go.

While the Samsung Galaxy Z Flip 3 5G won't be for everyone, this is a device that proves folding phones can actually work for the masses. Samsung has combined style and standout features with well thought out software, and it all comes under a price tag that doesn't make your eyes water.

COMPACT CAM

Despite being small, the Garmin 66 manages to pack in plenty of extra features, such as GPS and smartphone integration with the Garmin Virb app. There's also Lane Departure and Forward Collision warning, as well as Speed Camera warnings. The video footage is great as well, recording in 1440p with an ultra-wide 180-degree field of view. And its small 3M magnet mount makes removal and placement of the dash cam incredibly easy. The downside is the slightly fiddly menu system and the inconsistent voice control.





4K FORWARD. 2K BACK

The Thinkware U1000's front-facing camera shoots 4K video for increased resolution and detail, while the optional-extra rear camera records in up to 2K when paired with the U1000. Footage captured by the rear camera is stored on the same microSD card as used by the front camera. When hardwired to the vehicle, both cameras offer motion detection to record footage while parked. Driver assistance features, including red light and speed camera warnings, plus warnings for average and mobile speed cameras, all use the unit's GPS.

ash cams have become incredibly popular car accessories in recent years, keeping a faithful eye on the road ahead and recording footage when a collision is detected. Some even boast

driver-assistance systems to help keep you alert and safe.

With so many great models on offer these days, we figured you could use a hand picking out which suits your needs.

But what if an incident happens behind you? Say

someone drives into the rear of your car, but isn't willing to accept the blame, or even flees second, rear-facing dash cam could come to the rescue, which is why we've also included two models that can watch your back.





THE FORWARD-FACING KING

NEXTBASE 622GW £249, nextbase.com

The latest dash cam from Nextbase boasts much-improved video quality; plump for the 4K at 30fps video resolution and the resulting footage is incredibly detailed, vibrant and smooth. Even in poor lighting, it's easy to pick out details, while a special Super Slow-Mo mode (1080p at 120fps) means it is now easier than ever to read registration plates on fast-moving vehicles. Also, the inclusion of What3Words is clever, as it can alert emergency services of an exact location, even when there is no Wi-Fi or mobile data available.

BLACKVUE'S BACK VIEW

BLACKVUE DR900X-2CH £399, blackvue.com

The DR900X-2CH features a front-facing camera that records in 4K resolution with an 8MP sensor, while the rear camera captures footage in Full HD. Blackvue also sells an optional 4G module that enables remote notifications and live viewing, as well as two-way voice calls. There's also a parking mode that uses motion and vibration sensors to record footage to catch evidence of vandalism or a parking incident. Both cameras use a cylindrical design that should make the system less distracting to the driver.



THE A-BEAM

Sonos Beam

More deft and refined sound than most affordable soundbars, and with the bigger audio of Dolby Atmos

he original Sonos Beam was one of the best soundbars around, particularly because it brought high audio quality in a size small enough for compact TVs, which is not so common among other soundbars from big brands.

The second-generation Beam is the exact same size, but breaks new ground by including Dolby Atmos in such a small body. And it sounds ace, bringing the same quality and nuance to your TV's audio, but now with extra width and the extra position that Dolby Atmos can deliver.

The on-board processing here is massively more powerful than that in the original Beam, and this allows Sonos to deploy some potent digital sound processing in an effort to extract meaningful height, as well as width, from the second-generation Beam's presentation.

Another important change – essential, really, when you consider this is now a Dolby Atmos soundbar – is the inclusion of eARC HDMI functionality. There are just three physical inputs at the back of the Beam: eARC HDMI, Ethernet and power.

The one disappointment is that there's still no HDMI passthrough, which makes it a less universal product than it otherwise would have been. It means that if you use it with a TV that doesn't have Dolby Atmos decoding, you may not get the full effect of its audio capabilities. It also means that one of your TVs precious HDMI ports is dedicated solely to this soundbar, which might be limiting.

Otherwise, the most obvious change is decorative. The second-gen Beam retains the same dimensions as the outgoing one (a tidy 651x100x69mm), but it now features the polycarbonate grille Sonos debuted on the bigger and more potent Sonos Arc soundbar.

In either finish (black or white are available), it's discreet, good-looking and flawlessly finished. The new grille is easier to dust, which is definitely a nice upgrade for any TV equipment, given how it always ends up.

If we're being charitable, the height effect when listening to a Dolby Atmos movie soundtrack is subtle. If we're being uncharitable, it could be a lot more assertive. But as long as you're not expecting the sort of audio power that the giant and expensive Samsung HW–Q950A or Sennheiser Ambeo produce, the height and width of the Beam's presentation ought to be fine. And in every other respect, 'satisfactory' is severely understating its performance.

As far as usability goes, well, you're spoilt for choice. The Sonos S2 control app remains the gold standard where these things are concerned: it's logical, legible, stable and so simple to use you just know it cost a fortune to develop.

Let's be clear: the second generation Sonos Beam doesn't give you full-on Dolby Atmos. You have to spend a lot more for that, and go a lot bigger, usually. But if 'all' you want is big, bold and well-realised movie sound from a compact, high-performance soundbar, Sonos has just replaced its best product with its best product. £449 amazon.co.uk

A HERO'S WELCOME

GoPro HERO 10 Black



Multiple tweaks move the game on a little in a lot of areas, including improved video quality, slicker operation and tuned-up smarts

he Apple of action cams has done it again, iterating enough to be certain that there is a perceptible improvement, but not enough to hinder sales of the older, now slightly cheaper model. We gave the HERO 9 Black five stars, and it's still a fantastic camera, but the HERO 10 Black is better in multiple ways.

It's visually identical to the groundbreaking GoPro HERO 9 Black; the only obvious differences being the GoPro logo under the front screen is a natty blue and the body is slightly darker.

Elsewhere, the similarities continue: the battery compartment, USB-C charge port, 1720mAh Lithium battery and battery lid could be the same components. The flip down 'fingers' to mount the camera are identical to the HERO 9 Black, which makes them backwards compatible with many years worth of GoPro mounts.

The operation buttons are also identical to the HERO 9 Black, a side mode and power button, and a top-mounted record button, both rubberised and glove-compatible thanks to nice big surfaces. LCD screens are the same size as the HERO 9 Black, but the rear screen has much improved touch sensitivity baked in, which is immediately obvious flicking through the menus.

The one major change to the exterior is the removable main lens cover. It looks the same, but is equipped with hydrophobic, water-shedding glass and is more scratch-resistant with reduced ghosting. Fingermarks can just be swiped away with another finger and water beads just run off.

Inside the GP2 chipset is the key big improvement, giving direct benefits like quicker boot and faster transfers, while indirectly upping the image and video quality.

Both video and photo quality have been significantly boosted, with video now topping out at a massive 5.3K, 60FPS, 4K at a blistering 120FPS, and 2.7K/240p, while stills are cranked up to 23MP. Broadly, the frame rates are doubled over the HERO 9 Black, and frame grabs are also teased up a touch, 19.6MP from 5K video, and 15.8MP from 5.3K video. The audio capture doesn't match, only being reasonable.

Elsewhere weight is down to a mere 153 grams, although that feeling of top heaviness can still strike when helmet-mounted. On the bright side, you've got the new HyperSmooth 4.0 in-camera stabilisation to offset wobbling. It's clear that the battery is working hard, with the unit getting warm to the touch when charging. Indeed, shooting about 30 minutes of 5.3K/60FPS made the camera cut out several times. You get about an hour per charge at high resolution, longer for less. But on the plus side it's easy to swap out the battery for a fresh one.

The big question, of course, is whether you should rush out and buy one, something that's slightly muddied by the GoPro subscription structure. For GoPro subscribers, it's easily worth £50 more than the GoPro HERO 9 Black. For anyone who doesn't want to sign up, or is already the proud owner of a HERO 9 Black, this will be a tougher decision.
