A colon is 2 dots on top of each other like ':'. They often follow after an explanation, before a list and to introduce a quote, and they add extra information to what has already been said. For example: 'Einstein once said: '*Imagination is more important than knowledge.*" would be a colon before a quote. The correct use of a colon in a list would be, 'There are so many things to buy: soccer balls, hockey goals, shin pads and rugby balls!' The person saying this sentence states that there are a lot of things to buy and adds extra information by listing some of the things. An incorrect use for this would be, 'In the shop, there is: soccer balls, hockey goals, shin pads and rugby balls.' This is incorrect, because you haven't yet stated that there are a lot of things in the shop. Another way of using colons is in a letter to someone, or an email, etc. An example for this would be, 'Dear Grandma: Thank you for the cookies - they were very nice.'
