JUNIOR ADVISEMENT

- 30-minute individual appointment
 - Passes will be given to Ist block teacher
- Remaining graduation requirements
 - complete Individual Graduation Plan= IGP
- Parents will have a virtual/remote option to join
 - Communication through CTLS & Kell Counseling website

DUAL ENROLLMENT (DE)

- I Ith and I2th graders can take college classes while completing their high school diploma.
- Pays for 100% tuition, mandatory fees, and required textbooks up to a maximum cap of 30 hours
 - (this equates to roughly one year of full-time college enrollment or around 10 courses)
- The goal is to increase college access and completion and prepare students to enter the workforce with the skills they need to succeed.

- If you're interested in Dual Enrollment, the first step is to attend the DE Summit TONIGHT from 6-8pm

- Attend Virtual DE Summit & Kell Info session (1st STEP)
- Research your DE college's admissions requirements and deadlines
- Apply to the college:
 - Submit SAT/ACT/Accuplacer scores (take these ASAP!)
 - Request official transcript

Meet with your counselor to decide DE classes and complete paperwork

INTERESTED IN DUAL ENROLLMENT?

Just a few things to consider:

Full-time or part-time participation
Whether your future college will accept transfer credits
How your future college might compare DE vs. AP
Are you ready for college level classes?

Transportation and parking

Potential schedule complications, both in-school and extracurricular (especially for part-time participation)

Cobb County and college calendars are different — exam dates, spring/fall/winter breaks will be different

- Take the ASVAB
- Military academy appointments are highly competitive- but great scholarship

REQUIREMENTS: THEY AREN'T THE SAME...

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION

- Determined by GA Department of Ed (DOE)
- Tracked by you, your teachers, and your school counselor
- Are needed before you earn a diploma – you graduate if you earn the minimum
- Includes 23 required credits in specific areas

COLLEGE ADMISSION

- Determined by the individual college
- Tracked by you it is your responsibility to find out what the school wants
- Are needed before you can be accepted – you may not be accepted with just the minimum
- Includes SAT, ACT, Accuplacer

WHAT DOES "COLLEGE" MEAN?

There are several types of schools someone with a high school diploma can attend to earn an undergraduate degree or certificate.

- Specialty School (certificate or diploma)
- 2-year and/or Technical
 College (certificate, diploma or Associate's degree)
- 4-year college/university
 (Bachelor's degree)

HOW DO I GET TO COLLEGE?

- Research online
- Attend college fairs and info sessions
- Crete a list of potential schools (safety, probable & reach)
- Compare your profile to the school's freshman profile/index
- Visit potential schools when possible

APPLICATION PROCESS: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Review College or University admissions requirements:
 - Online application
 - Ex: Common Application, GA Futures, directly on website
 - Transcript
 - Self-report or official
 - Test scores (send directly from ACT or College Board)
 - Application fee (fee waiver for free/reduced lunch students)
 - Recommendations (only if required by the college)
 - Counselor Recommendation (or school evaluation)
 - Teacher Recommendation (letter or form, typically a core teacher)
- Know the deadlines! They are firm
- Apply senior year

ACT VS. SAT

BEGIN TESTING SPRING OF JUNIOR YEAR

WWW.ACTSTUDENT.ORG

- 4 sections (Math, English, Science, Reading <u>and</u> optional Writing)
- No penalty for guessing
- 36 maximum score
- Free online practice: ACT Academy

WWW.SAT.ORG

- 2 sections (Math and Reading <u>and</u> optional Writing)
- No penalty for guessing
- 1600 maximum score
- Free online practice: Khan Academy

It is the student's responsibility to check with the individual colleges for all admission requirements.

OTHER TESTS I MAY NEED

- ACCUPLACER Placement exam for two year and technical colleges. (Schedule to take this test at chosen college)
- ASVAB Aptitude/career exam required for entrance into the military that determines your eligibility for military jobs
- SAT Subject Tests Required by a few highly competitive colleges

HOPE SCHOLARSHIP

- 3.0 core GPA as calculated by GSFC (<u>www.gafutures.org</u>)
 - · Can be earned in college
- Must earn a minimum of 4 credits from the academic rigor course list prior to graduating from high school.
 (Review your HOPE transcript on GAfutures.org)
- Two year or four year degree
- Must graduate from a GA high school
- Must be a GA resident for at least one year (Green Card or citizenship)
- Covers a percentage of tuition

HOPE GRANT

- No initial GPA requirement
 - 2.0 required after the first 30 hours
- Technical certificate or diploma
- Must have a high school diploma or GED
- Must be a GA resident for at least one year (Green Card or citizenship)
- Covers a percentage of tuition

Apply for HOPE by completing the FAFSA during senior year.


ZELL MILLER SCHOLARSHIP

- Requires 3.7 core high school (HOPE) GPA as calculated by GSFC (www.gafutures.org). Requires 1200 SAT Math and Reading or 26 ACT composite in one test sitting
- Must earn a minimum of 4 credits from the academic rigor course list prior to graduating from high school. (Review your HOPE transcript on GAFutures.org)
- Pays 100% tuition for a two year or four-year degree
- Must graduate from a GA high school
- Must be GA resident for at least one year (Green Card or citizenship)
- Must maintain 3.3 in college. Student can drop to HOPE if GPA is lower than 3.3.

ZELL MILLER GRANT

- Requires 3.5 college GPA for grant eligibility
- Does not require minimum test score
- Covers 100% tuition (retroactively covers previous semester once 3.5 GPA is earned) for certificate or diploma at technical college
- Must graduate from a GA high school
- Must be GA Resident for at least one year (Green Card or citizenship)
- Must maintain 3.5 GPA while in college

Apply for Zell by completing the FAFSA after October 1st your senior year.

Loans	- Need to be repaid after college
Work-Study Programs	- Student has a job on campus

WHERE DO I FIND RESOURCES?

- College websites
- Various online resources GAfutures, Career Cruising, BigFuture (College Board), etc.
- Current employer or parent's employer
- Community
- Organizations you're involved with

HOW DO I GET THE MONEY?

- Create a resume and prepare a personal statement so you will be ready to apply
- SEARCH for scholarships everywhere (see column to the left) and follow the instructions to apply
- Apply early and often remember, scholarships have deadlines too!
- Complete the FAFSA as soon as possible after October Ist of senior year





- Answer the questions and select "Save and Finish"




