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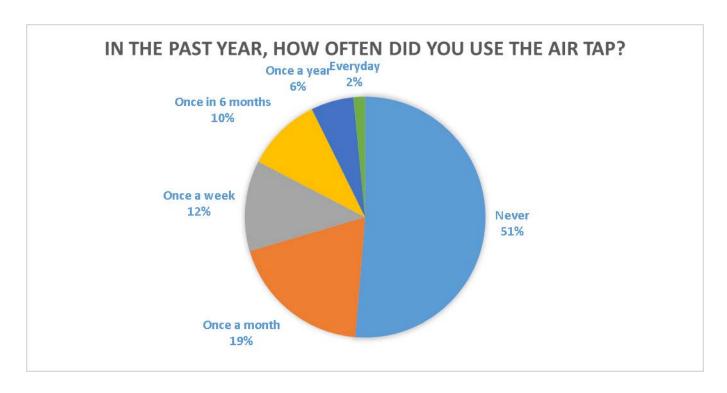
Equipment Frequency Breakdown by Device






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

Also, this requires low squat and concentration so as not to hurt the back. Pt. is also difficult to put into a sitting position from laying down, especially when the pt. is heavy. Could have used the Maxi Move to transfer as pt. from a bed to the stretcher. difficulty using body mechanics I am new to the hospital field and vitals were a bit challenging but with practice I should be ok. I currently don't find any of the tasks at hand challenging, if I am in need of assistance or help of others i have no problem with asking for the help of my co-workers. i didn't find any challenging task at work I do not find the task challenging. I enjoy leading the groups its hard to prevent Low frequency N/A Need to get help and use proper technique in order not to injure your back None not challenging our beds are not adjustable Our patients are expected to be ambulatory but have multiple fall risk factors patient fighting or refusing to cooperate dead weight Patients are not always comfortable with what they can do to try to get on a better track. It is my job to try to get them to understand there are more positive options and it's ok to look a bit deeper at their thoughts and behavior. The beds here on 1South are low to ground and bolted to the floor, they don't raise up. This is a recipe for back injuries.



I had a patient that had trouble swallowing but wanted to eat badly. He was an NPO patient that could barely speak but he was trying to eat any snack he could get his hands on. I would've liked to be better prepared as far as knowing which patient is NPO before I did my CO. That way I'm more mentally prepared on how to deal with the patient

I have not been in my position for a year yet. So far I think I have done a good job staying on top of patients, making sure they do not fall if they are a fall risk.

I just started working on the unit and I find that with time I will be better prepared to handle every patient.

I learned how to speak to patients about loss where they are very relieved and happy to finally speak about the emotions that they have been thinking about for a long time.

I was handling both the rounds and visiting when I should've been focusing on one task

Most of our patients are ambulatory or with minimal assist

Pt. is floridly psychotic and can not hold onto the SARA or Maximove to assist staff. She also can not have HoverMatt as she may slide off it as she is not immobile. Pt. has a walker but has used it as a weapon so this was taken away.

We had a catatonic pt but had to have him in a regular bed which was to low to the floor and we had difficulty positioning him.

we had one patient that was catatonic on the unit and I had somewhat of a hard time repostioning the patient due to the current beds that are on the unit being very low. I felt that the unit was somewhat unprepared to give this patient the best service that we could simply because of the low level of the beds that are placed on the unit. I believe if we continue to have catatonic patients on the unit, we should be more prepared with medical beds to prevent staff from hurting ourselves.

Once the machine was located, it took another 10 minutes to get the slings that we needed from general service. It was just very unorganized. We were unprepared.



Almost all of our patients are ambulatory.

I was caring for a posptarutm patient who'd had an epidural and needed to void. I asked the patient how her legs were feeling, if they were numb, and tested for leg strength. She described some numbness in one leg, and it strength tested slightly weaker than the other side. I suggested she use the bedpan, however, the patient insisted that she felt strong enough to ambulate and was strongly against using the bedpan. I helped her stand, which she did without problem. We began ambulating together, but after a few steps one of her legs buckled, and I had to call for assistance to get her back in bed. From this episode I learned that in the future, I should be more firm about the use of a bedpan if I do not feel the patient can ambulate, and that if I do attempt to help a patient ambulate I should make sure assistance is nearby.

Larger patient admitted to postpartum, should have been mentioned prior in order to get the appropriate sized equipment e, i larger hospital bed. In case of cesarean section, size of patient would definitely require need of equipment if unable to move self during routine cleaning and assessment.


