REBECCA O'BRIEN RN – ICU

My nomination for Nurse of Distinction 2020: Rebecca O'Brien. It started as a whisper, then a "hoax" and within a few days it became a pandemic that would change our lives forever. The ICU at Phelps Memorial was hit hard and fast. When the ICU quickly became saturated with COVID positive patients, we opened-up the 4-bed pediatric unit for COVID positive ventilated patients, and it soon became obvious that 5 South would be the next recipient of these patients. The nurses there had rarely dealt with ventilated patients, who also required numerous drips to adequately sedate and support them while being ventilated with increased PEEP settings. They were clearly overwhelmed and scared. It was then that one of my co-workers, went over to 5 South, surveyed the situation and immediately stepped up and rose to the challenge. She saw the incredible need and without a moment's hesitation, decided to take over the responsibility of managing 5 South and Peds. She worked relentlessly with Phelps anesthesiologists who had been recruited to care for these patients. A job they had never had to deal with, long term vented patients, but it was with her guidance and support, they rose to the occasion and managed the care of these seriously ill patients for many, many weeks. Not only did she manage these doctors but all the nurses and essential workers from other units that had been sent there to help. She trained PACU and OR nurses who had never cared for long termed ventilated patients. She was able to ease their fears of being outside their comfort zone and made an intolerable situation, tolerable. She gave them confidence and support and eventually the security they needed. They survived and became a huge addition to her and to the care of

these patients. She worked constantly, virtually never taking a day off throughout this pandemic. She rarely saw her son or even enjoy a vacation that had previously been scheduled to serve a greater need. I have gone to people who worked with her during this time and asked them for their comments. They said she was the most extraordinary nurse they had ever worked with. She made their jobs easier, and she was their every day in every way. She is a hero but first a nurse who stepped up in a time when we needed her guidance and support and undying dedication to face this pandemic. She made it possible for these COVID positive patients to survive or comforted them and their loved ones as they passed away. In the words of Mary McDermott, "She showed extraordinary courage, compassion, kindness, and patience with every patient, family member and colleague." She surpassed every expectation. She took an utterly chaotic situation and made it controlled chaos. As the pandemic began to calm down, she began working with Dr. Komorowski and all her efforts to introduce the convalescent plasma into the treatment of these COVID-19 patients. She then went on to help in the COVID testing tent, by administering the test to patients in need of that. This year she completed her master's degree in Nursing Education, and weekly instructed nursing students on 5 north. All this time, while working full time in the Intensive Care Unit. Where she also continued to support her co-workers and serve on the Pharmacy committee. As I am sure you will agree she truly is an inspiration to all of us and truly a "Nurse of Distinction".

2) Rebecca first came to Phelps hospital in 2006 as an ICU Technician, and while she was working as a technician, she completed her bachelor's degree in Nursing at Pace University. Rebecca graduated from Pace with her BSN in 2008 and immediately began her nursing career as a Telemetry nurse on 5South. Rebecca is an excellent

nurse leader, always advocating for both the safety of patients and nursing staff. She demonstrated her leadership above and beyond during the COVID surge earlier this year by bravely helping manage the 5S turned ICU unit working with nursing staff both experience and inexperienced in critical care. In every emergent situation we experience in critical care, she is always willing to take a lead and works well with every discipline in the team. On top of all of these, she serves as the Chairperson of the medication safety council; she is a member of the organ donor committee as well as the ICU education council. Rebecca is an exceptional educator, working with nursing students at Mercy College as their clinical instructor and helping to facilitate and mold the future minds of the nursing profession. Rebecca also mentors and precepts nursing students here at Phelps as well as new hires and floor nurses who are making the transition to ICU.
